COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTS G. M. DREW AS WARDEN

John Taylor Was Runner-up —Warden-Elect From Olden Township.

The Frontenac county council elected Reeve G. Melville Drew, Olden township, as warden at its inaugural meeting on Tuesday afternoon. The contest for the warden-ship was between Reeve John Taylor, Storrington, and Mr. Drew, and the latter won out in caucus by ten to seven. When council met, the selection of Reeve Drew was made unanimous on motion of Reeves Hamilton and Halliday. After the warden-elect had been escorted to

the chair by the mover and seconder, he thanked his colleagues for the honor they had bestowed upon him. He said he would try and do the right thing at all times and try to serve the best interests of the county. Warden Drew said that he would advocate the practice of economy in the work of the council this year.

Communications Read.

Among the communications received were the following:

From secretary-treasurer, Ontario Municipal Association, that the government has under way the making of arrangements for sending copies of all bills and proposed legislation to municipal clerks, who will therefore be apprised of acts of the legislature in advance of final action.

From the town council of Hespeler, sending copy of resolution that it disapproves of the proposal of the Educational Department of Ontario to raise the examination standards for matriculation to the universities, as it is the opinion that the standards as prevailing are quite high enough and asking for endorsement of Frontenac council.

From Department of Agriculture, that a closer co-operation between the department and the local people would be mutually advantageous in carrying on the agricultural representative's work; and asking that the county council appoint an advisory committee to work in co-operation with the agricultural representative.

From clerk, county of Perth, send-

ing copy of petition adopted by that council that the Provincial Highway Act be amended so that the government will assume the full cost of the construction and maintenance of said highway.

From clerk, Northumberland and Durham, that an effort be made to induce the provincial government to assume all the cost of construction and maintenance of the provincial highways. To this end it is suggested that delegates be appointed by each of such councils to meet at a convenient place (say Kingston) as early a date as possible for the purpose of taking joint action to memorialize the government as to assuming the whole cost of construction and maintenance of the provincial highway.

From county clerk, Cornwall, in matter of counties expense at jail, stating that auditor of criminal justice accounts at Toronto refuses to classify prisoners as government prisoners in the dietary adjustments because their offences are not indictable, and copy of petition to add certain clauses to the Ontario Temperance Act, respecting prisoners sentenced under provisions of said act.

From Messrs. King & Smythe, barristers, on behalf of Mrs. Emily Kemp, who asks for damages, alleged to be due for non-repair of suburban road.

Warden-Elect Drew.

Frontenac has an able warden in G. Melville Drew, who puts pep into all he does. He was born at Long Lake in Olden township thirty-eight years ago, the son of Henry Drew, who was warden of Frontenac in 1907. Thus the son follows in the municipal footsteps of the father. Two years ago the father moved into Ernestown township and at the recent elections he was elected a member of the Ernestown council. Warden Drew did prospecting work in the Abitibi district of northern Ontario before there was a railroad in there. That was eighteen years ago. He was married eleven years ago and has two children. Warden Drew is a progressive farmer of the north and owns the farm his father used to work. Eleven years ago he entered municipal life as well as matrimony, and became a member of the Olden council. He has been a member of the council ever since and this is his third year as Reeve of Olden and member of the Frontenac county council. Warden Drew is a Methodist in religion, a Conservative in politics, and a member of the Masonic Order, the Oddfellows, the Orangemen and Prentice Boys. Since his entry to the county council he has been regarded as one of that body's best debaters and should make a good presiding officer. Warden Drew was the first member of any county council in Ontario to issue a deft to the Ontario Highways Department over the provincial road charges. His motion moved in council last June to refuse payment of the charge against Frontenac was carried. He fought against provincial road charges being made against the northern townships of Frontenac, owing to the provincial highway running through the most southerly part of the county, and the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board relieved those townships of liability. The new warden has had military training. For three years he was sergeant with "A" squadron of the 4th Hussars.

FIRE ESTIMATES TAKEN UP

At Meeting of Fire and Light Committee—Will Ask For \$34,422.11.

Estimates for the year came up for discussion at the meeting of the civic fire and light committee on Tuesday afternoon, and they were passed on to the city council.

This year the committee is asking in its budget for \$34,422.11, as compared with \$33,851 allowed the committee in the budget of last year.

Some repairs should be made at once to the cupola of the tower on the Ontario street fire hall, and on motion of Ald. Marcellis, it was decided to have the work done by day labor, under the supervision of the city engineer and Ald. Holder.

When the question of new street lights was under discussion, Ald. Holder asked for three new lights, one for the corner of Kent and Russell streets; Kent and Thomas streets, and Thomas and Montreal streets.

Ald. Marcellis asked for a light on Macdonald street at the head of Meek street, and Chief Armstrong asked for one at the corner of Albert and King streets. The recommendations will be passed on to the council. The Board of Works will be asked to trim trees on Garrett street, as it is claimed that the trees are responsible for the poor lighting on this street at present.

Chief Armstrong informed the committee that following the fire at the dairy school, there had been some criticism regarding the fire, its cause, how it had been handled, and the condition of the water pressure. He announced that a provincial fire marshal would hold an investigation in the city council chamber at 2:30 p.m., Wednesday for the purpose of hearing evidence, and extended an invitation to any person interested to attend.

The committee recommended that the tender of Charles Donoghue, to supply 850 bushels of oats at 60 cents a bushel be accepted.

The chairman, Ald. Chown, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Alds. Milne, Johnston, Godwin, Bawden, Holder and Marcellis.

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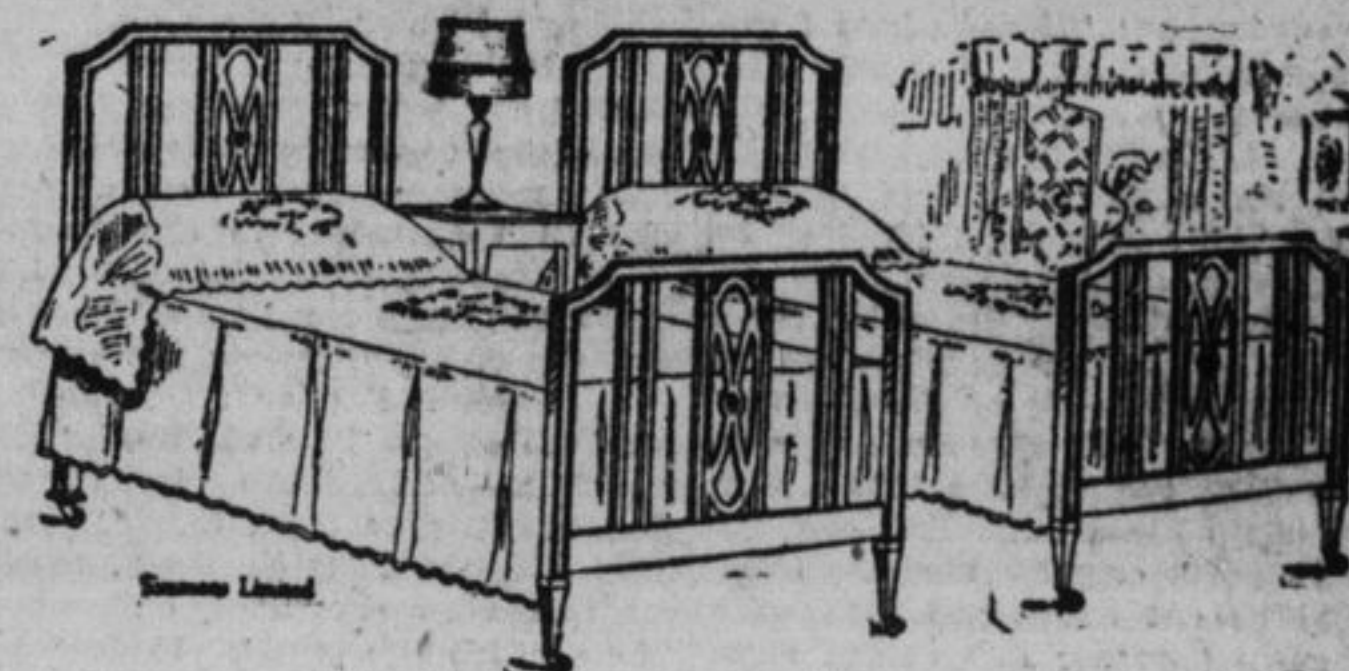
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
