Also responding to the same toast. Prof. E. A. Dale, of the university of Toronto, and formerly on the Queen's staff, reminded the students that the university man's training should take him in the direction of service to his country. He also briefly reviewed the historical development of Canada and in describing the effects of the country on the mind of the newcomer to Canada referring to his own experience stated that one of the most noticeable features was the spirit of optimism which prevails everywhere.

"Queen's University" was preposed by Brig.-Gen. Sir A. C. Macdonell, who impressed on his hearers that they were the men who would decide whether or not Canada would remain Canadian or whether the influx from overseas would in the future prevail. The universities were producing the leaders, the speaker stressed, but above all things he urged the students to think for themselves and not to depend on other
