### COUNTY COUNCILLORS INSPECT THE JAIL

Sibbit, Pittsburg, is chairman, made an inspection of the county jail on Friday morning, they had a look at Frederick Bryant, who was committed to jail on the charge of murder. When the committee entered the corridor where Bryant is confined, they found him busy at his toilet. He did not appear to mind his position in the slightest. The jail officials are taking no chances on Bryant making a getaway, as they have him attired in a suit of jail clothes. Bryant did not have anything to say to the county councillors.

A representative of the Whig, who accompanied the members of the committee, found that there were eleven men and one woman confined to jail. The woman has almost completed her time, and was to be released, but on the orders of the immigration department she is to be deported to the United States. The woman is so pleased with the treatment she has received during the past month that she is not anxious to leave the matron, Miss Brooks.

The county councillors were very much impressed with the cleanliness of the jail. A great deal of the prisoners' time is taken up with keeping the walls well painted.

It is very likely that the committee will recommend to council that the floor of the hallway leading into the jail be replaced with the which was taken out of the county registrar's office.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Discusses Unemployment Relief—Bank Tender Accepted.

The civic finance committee met on Thursday evening and was waited upon by Mrs. John Wright and Ex-Mayor Nickle, of the unemployment relief committee, who pointed out that the fund collected by the Kiwanis Club might last only three weeks longer and asking what the city council intended doing to see that the work of relief was continued. A sub-committee was appointed to go into the question and report at the next meeting of finance. The members of the committee are of the opinion that the city should take advantage of the offer of the governments to pay half of the amount municipalities pay out to help the unemployed.

Tenders were received from the banks for the city's account, and it was decided that the offer of the Bank of Nova Scotia was the best. Accordingly the city's account will remain with this bank whose new offer is somewhat better than before.
