TO EXPEND \$109,700 ON THE COUNTY ROADS

During the Present Year—
\$16,000 Additional For
Suburban Area.

The Frontenac county council concluded its January session on Saturday morning after having dealt with some momentous business during the week. At the concluding session, a motion was passed instructing the county solicitor to make application to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board asking that it order that the 1920 provincial highway cost apportioned to Frontenac county be levied upon the same townships as the board recently decided the 1919 levy should be made. This eliminates the north townships and the Islands from participation in the cost of the provincial highway. The council desires this done without a further hearing by the board, so that debentures may be issued for the full amount, viz., \$101,000.

At the Friday afternoon session of council the good roads committee at the request of A. M. Rankin, chairman of the Kingston suburban road area, recommended that \$16,000 be provided for work in 1922; that no action be taken on the claim of Mrs. Emily Kemp for \$500 damages owing to alleged non-repair of a piece of suburban road area, that no action be taken on the claim of Frederick Amey for damage done to his car by alleged non-repair of county road; that the whole council attend the Ontario Good Roads convention to be held in Toronto; that the county road superintendent, the county clerk and the county auditor attend the convention of county road superintendents in Toronto; that the good roads committee and the warden attend at the court house on Feb. 15th to meet delegates from other counties in regard to cost of maintenance of the provincial highway.

The good roads committee also recommend that the following estimates be approved for 1922:

Provincial county roads—Construction \$15,000; bridge \$3,000; maintenance and repairs \$15,000.

County roads—Construction \$25,000; bridge \$4,000; maintenance and repair \$40,000; machinery \$6,000; superintendent \$1,700.

This makes a total of \$109,700 for road work to be done in Frontenac during 1922.

The roads and bridges committee recommend that the clerk send the account for repairing Webb's bridge at Indian Lake and approach there- to to the clerk of the corporation of Lennox and Addington, and also half the expense of the county committee.

All of the above recommendations were adopted by the council. These recommendations of the finance committee were adopted; That the bank rate in the bylaw be changed from six to five and one-half per cent; that a temporary levy of two mills be made for good road work; that the Ontario government be requested to change the Ontario Temperance Act so that those serving sentences for violations be classified as government and not as county prisoners; that the warden be authorized to have debentures issued for provincial highway work in 1919 and 1920; that \$16,000 cover the Frontenac county and city of Kingston suburban road area work in 1922.

The finance committee also instructed the clerk to investigate and find out if any widows were receiving pensions or any aged county people were being kept in homes for the aged whose children were able to care for them. It is felt that the county should not be called upon to pay for the keep of old folks whose children should look after them, as is provided by a recent statute passed by the Ontario legislature.

County Auditor Muir presented his annual report, showing a balance of \$367.10. The Frontenac debenture debt at the close of 1921 was \$53,000.

On recommendation of the finance committee, W. J. Tomlinson, Sharbot Lake, was appointed high county constable at an initial salary of \$150 a year.

The property committee recommended that a telephone be installed in the office of the county registrar; that the floor in the turnkey's jail quarters be relaid; that Road Superintendent Fair be allotted the council clock room as a temporary office and that necessary furniture be purchased.

The committee on printing and education recommended that the county clerk notify the clerks of the several municipalities of the powers of township councils in regard to small attendance in certain schools mentioned by Inspector S. A. Truscott, Frontenac South. Mr. Truscott pointed out that it would be better if some of the schools were closed and the few pupils attending them sent elsewhere.
