**INDUSTRIAL WEEKLY REVIEW KINGSTON**

**FISHERIES EMPLOY HUNDRED THOUSAND**  
Approximately Sixty Millions Invested in Them in Canada.

The fishing industry of Canada is one of great magnitude, and it is only on investigation that we realize the amount of money invested in it, the number of people working in it, and how vast its scope really is. There are about one hundred thousand people of Canada employed in the catching and processing of fish and fully fifty thousand more are engaged in selling and merchandising it. This is only the beginning, however, and the final number of people directly and indirectly employed as the result of the fishing industry is set at about four hundred thousand, or about one tenth of the total population of the country.

This fact is quite astonishing in itself, but, when it is known that our fishery resources have only been but slightly developed as yet, the tremendous possibilities of the situation are obvious. Could we but find an outlet for all the fish we might produce, there would be room for the employment of many times that number and millions might trace their livelihood from humble fish.

The vital part the industry plays in our national economy cannot be ignored, and it is the object of National Fish Day, February first, to focus attention on it. From the capital point of view, we find that some sixty millions of dollars are invested in the Canadian fishing industry, of which one half is in primary operations—boats, nets, and fishing gear, and the other fifty per cent. in canneries and other shore branches of the trade. There is an erroneous impression that our fishing industry is controlled by foreign capital but statistics furnish no justification for this idea whatever. As far as that goes, it would not be amiss if a few foreign millions could be further introduced into the developing to a greater degree of the industry, but, at the present time, it is Canadian controlled to almost the last dollar.

It is interesting to note what kind of apparatus is used by those who do the primary operation of catching the fish. In 1919, some 35,905 sail, row and gasoline boats were used valued at \$7,011,120. Sailing and gasoline vessels to the number of 1,091 were valued at \$5,243,793 and steam vessels, numbering 172, were valued at \$1,449,365. Ten steam trawlers were in the service, valued at \$1,075,000. Nearly three quarters of the fish taken on the Atlantic were caught within ten miles of shore and the inshore fishing is considered as the most valuable to the industry.

**National Fish Day.**

**Textile Products Exhibition Attractive**

Manufacturers of textiles are co-operating to insure the success of the Textile Products Exhibition that is being held from February 13th to 17th in the King Edward Hotel. Within sixteen days after the plan was opened the great majority of booths and rooms were engaged and only a few more remain to be filled. Almost the entire mezzanine floor has been reserved for the exhibition. The show is a trade event only, and representatives will be admitted by ticket or by badge showing that the wearer is a delegate to one of the Retail Merchants' Association conventions being held that week. The officials conducting the exhibition are confident that well over 3,000 will be in attendance. Representatives will be present from every province in the Dominion. This is the first show of its kind put on in Canada, although it has frequently been done in the United Kingdom and in Europe. The manufacturers will withhold all their special spring releases until the time of the show and many of the retailers will be able to see them there. This should be of interest locally as we have a large branch of one of the biggest textile concerns in the country.

**Fiji Gives Preference To Canadian Products**

Under the new preferential tariff of Fiji, which became operative on January 1st, 1922, imports from Canada and other part of the British Empire were given a preference of 12 1/2 per cent. ad valorem in the case of goods subject to ad valorem duties, and a preferential rate of fifty per cent. lower than the general list in the case of articles subject to specific duties. As the free list is very limited, this means a preference on nearly all commodities. The only products for which a tariff preference has not been provided are certain oils and the liquid products of petroleum, not specifically mentioned in the tariff, on which the rate is 2d per gallon.

**Washing Machines.**  
Washing machines are no longer an experiment. Predictions are always made in the early production of most articles that they are impracticable, a fad, or that their use will be but of short duration. Those predictions were freely made concerning the electric washer in the earlier days of the industry. Now the practicability, permanency and economy of the washing machine is accepted as a matter of course. Formerly a house-keeper felt that she needed to give an explanation when she purchased a washing machine. Today the absence of one from the home is usually attended by an alibi. In Kingston a very good line can be seen at the store of the Halliday Electric Company on the corner of King and Princess streets, together with all other things electrical.

**Fur Auction.**  
Fifty thousand pelts were auctioned off at the first sale of the Winnipeg Fur Auction Sales Company this winter. There was a strong demand for all classes, and the bidding was keen between Canadian and United States buyers. Prices varied, but on the whole were slightly higher than those of the last sale.
