Three games were played in the County Hockey League on Saturday afternoon. The games were very fast considering that the ice was a little rough due to the mild weather.

Sunbury Defeated Glenburnie. By outplaying their opponents in the second and third periods Sunbury attained a 4 to 1 victory over Glenburnie at the Jack Hartley arena on Saturday afternoon in the county hockey league game.

The scores at the end of the first period was 1 to 1, and in the second twenty minutes they added three more scores. The game was one of the best games of hockey played in the county hockey league so far this season.

It was in the first period that the Sunbury boys started to get the best of the play. Their defence players, composed of Patterson and Campbell, were able to use their bodies to advantage with the result that it broke down the effectiveness of the Glenburnie forwards.

The Sunbury team is a fast organization and will give any of the teams in the county league a run for their money. The defence is composed of three men who use their heads all the while. Clifford Patterson is an exceptionally good player

and is able to break up the rushes and then carry the puck up the ice. L. Peterson, who acted as a substitute player has the making of a good defence man. The Gordon brothers are wonderful players. They back checked the best of any players on the ice. Howard Gordon is a very fast skater and was able to worm through the Glenburnie defence.

Noble, who played right wing, handled himself well and was responsible for one of the goals. The Glenburnie boys did not put up as good a game as they did a week ago. George Vair, who was the star on that occasion, was a little off color but put up a good exhibition.

When the first period opened Howard Gordon carried the puck for three quarters the length of the rink and then could not score. Russell Hogan rushed but could not register. Both teams started to mix things up and the players were playing little or no attention when the referee sounded the bell. Glenburnie had a little better of the play for a few minutes and hammered the puck at the Sunbury goal but it would not enter. During the hard checking George Vair was thrown into the air but he stayed in the game. Both

Harvey Hawkey and Noble came together near the side of the rink but they were separated before anything happened.

bury to have the better of the argument. Howard Gordon shot on the net and the rubber hit the goal post. A minute later Noble followed in his shot and made it count for the second goal. Glenburnie missed a couple of goals by inches. Gordon made the score 3 to 1 by a shot from the side and one minute later he hammered the puck past Goaler Orr for the fourth goal of the game. 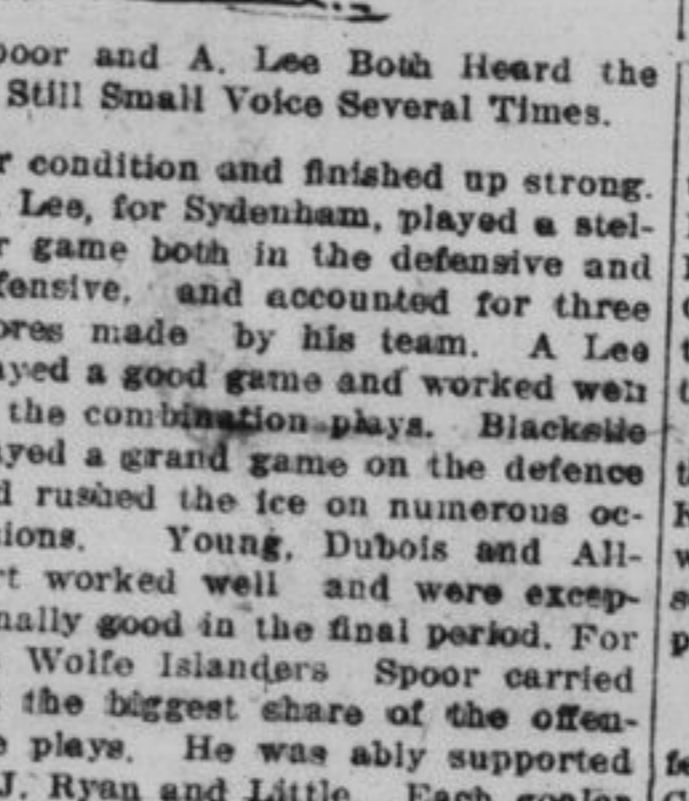

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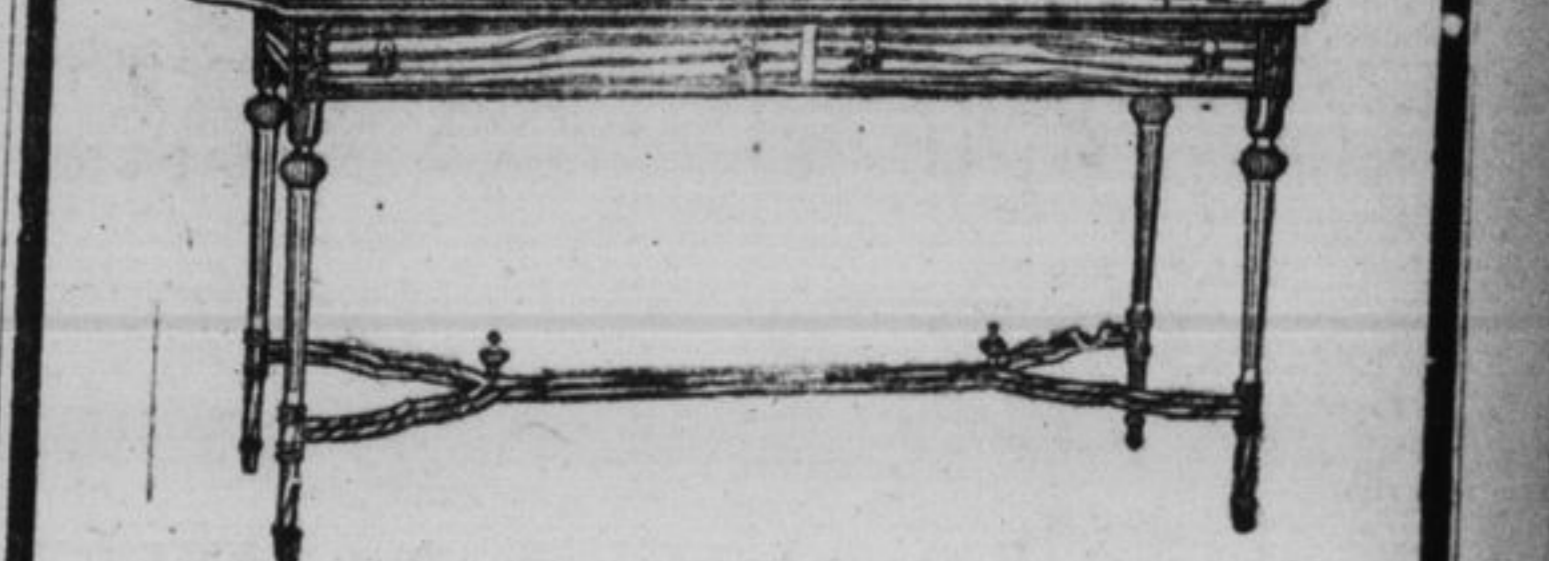


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
