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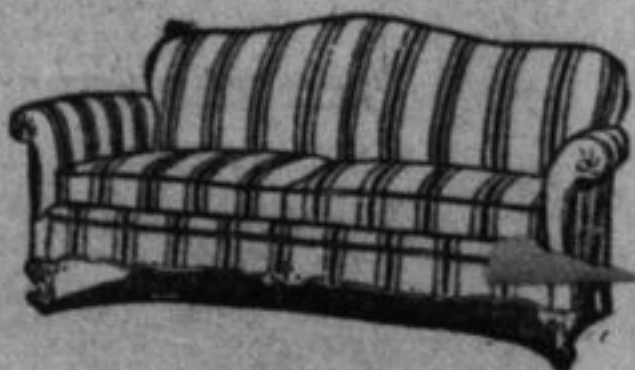

## NOT CUT INTO SCHOOL TAXES

undersstood it was not the intention of the separate schools to have a representative on this board this year.

"What does that mean?" asked Trustee Jones.

Trustee Jones said he regarded the resolution as passed by the Toronto board of education as a mild one. He desired the schools to remain as at present.

Trustee Elliott said he would agree to the third clause of the resolution which called for no legislation to "increase Roman Catholic Separate school revenue at the expense of our public schools." Trustee Jones agreed to elimination of previous clauses.

There was some further discussion on the matter, and finally the resolution as amended, moved by Trustee Jones, seconded by Trustee Norman, was carried.

### Heard a Deputation.

A deputation, composed of Mrs. H. E. Day, Mrs. L. T. Best, J. G. Ettinger and H. D. Wightman waited on the board, in support of a request from the Home and School Club of Victoria school, to have Victoria school examined, with a view to determining the most suitable location for an assembly room, and that definite plans be made for its construction for that club, which is prepared to co-operate with the board, in equipping the room, and prepare plans for providing ways and means for doing its part in this desirable undertaking.

Members of the deputation were heard in the matter, and put forth their case in an able manner, and the matter was referred to the property committee.

The board received a letter from W. F. Inman, in regard to the same matter.

Charlotte Lovick made application for the position of public school representative on the board of entrance examinations. Referred to the management committee.

M. E. Jardine, clerk of Hespeler, Ont., submitted a resolution passed by the council there, dealing with the proposal of the department of education to raise the examination standards for matriculation to the universities. The council disapproves of the proposals to raise the examination standards for matriculation to the university.

The council believes that the present standards are quite high enough and that if any changes are made, it will be the means of shutting out scholars of average ability.

Asked for his opinion in regard to the matter, Principal Sitter said that he thought the proposed change would be to the advantage of the students. It would hold them longer in the collegiate. They would be doing part of their course there, and he considered this was the best place for them to take it. The board took no action.

The letter from H. K. Vipond, asking the board to give the Penny Bank system a trial, was filed, as the board has already dealt with the matter.

Emna Wilder, on behalf of the Home and School club of Rideau school, asked the property committee for a grant of \$50, to help buy a Victrola which the club is endeavoring to secure. Referred to the property committee.

M. V. Compton, secretary, wrote the board on behalf of the Home and School club of Central school, stating that the club has purchased a lantern, and asking the board to provide a table and means of darkening a room, and also to connect the lantern. The property committee will deal with the matter.

McKelvey & Birch asked whether or not Cataract school could be rented or purchased for manufacturing purposes. Referred to the property committee.

**Property Committee's Report.**  
The report of the property committee, submitted by Chairman Trustee J. B. Cooke was received and adopted. The report follows:

"That a grant of \$150 be made by the board towards the purchase of a piano for the Central school by the Home and School club.

"That Joseph Gould, formerly caretaker of the Central school, be given a retiring allowance of \$25 per month for the year 1922.

"That the day carpentering necessary in the public schools during the year be given to Wm. Holder and George Hunter; collegiate institute, George A. Payne.

"In response to a resolution of the board asking for an estimate of the cost of seating the collegiate assembly room, your committee ascertained that 300 seats can be supplied for \$225, or at the rate of \$1.75 per seat.

"In order to give the board an idea of the activity of the different

school clubs, the requests received from the various secretaries are mentioned as follows:

"Macdonald School—A reception room furnished with tables and chairs.

Central School—\$150 towards the purchase of a piano; a kitchen equipped with an electric stove and hot and cold water; five more electric lights in the halls and basement; the green paint on the interior woodwork of the building removed; dark room prepared for lantern work.

"Frontenac School—An assembly room in the attic of the building, heated and seated; dark room for lantern work.

Robert Meek School—The yard improved.

"Louise School—Electric lighting installed throughout the building.

Rideau School—A grant of \$50 towards the purchase of a Victrola; an electric stove; single desks instead of the double ones now in the two rooms.

"Victoria School—An assembly room in the most convenient place in the building.

### Management Committee.

The following report of the management committee, submitted by the chairman, Trustee W. M. Campbell, was also adopted:

"That the expenses of the collegiate institute shooting team's trip to Toronto to take part in the competition in that city be paid by the board. The amount is \$120.

"That the request of Col. Gillespie to the effect that the public school cadet uniforms be cleaned and renovated, be granted, a government grant being available for the purpose.

"That new caps be procured for the C. I. cadets where necessary. The government has granted money to defray the expense.

"That household science equipment be purchased for that department to the value of \$30.

"That a drawing attachment be procured for the mimeograph at the collegiate institute at a cost of \$75.

A report of the finance committee, presented by the chairman, Trustee Mrs. Newlands, was also presented and adopted. It recommended the payment of the usual batch of accounts.

### Need for Skating Rinks.

The question of school skating rinks, which was under discussion at a recent meeting, was again taken up after the board had agreed to pay the sum of \$60 for the expense incurred at the collegiate rink. All the members are in favor of rinks, but the question to be considered is regarding how they shall be maintained. Trustee Mrs. Newlands moved to have a committee wait on the civic finance committee, and endeavor to secure the council to set aside a definite sum of money for rinks in suitable locations around the city. Her aim is to have the rinks conducted as municipal rinks, and properly supervised. Trustee W. J. C. Allen, seconded the motion, stating that he was hearing in favor of having the city operate these rinks.

Trustee Boyd moved in amendment, to have the playgrounds committee of the board, confer with the home and school clubs and work out a plan for rinks for next winter. This was seconded by Trustee Anglin, and on the matter going to a vote, the amendment was carried by a vote of 3 to 5.

**Reports of Officials.**  
Inspector J. Russell Stuart reported on the attendance in the public schools for January as follows:  
Enrollment in public schools, 2,750; average attendance, 2,456.  
Enrollment at Orphans Home, 23; average attendance, 23; total enrollment, 2,773; average attendance, 2,479. The enrollment in the public schools in 35 greater than January of last year.

Mr. Stuart also added the following in his report:  
"Rideau school is not properly cleaned, nor is the heating of the school satisfactorily attended to. This is a serious matter since it directly affects the health of pupils and teachers.

"The ventilating system of the Robert Meek school does not work satisfactorily."

The report of Principal E. O. Sitter, on the attendance at the collegiate institute during January showed the following:

Enrollment, 527; increase, 46; daily average, 576. This was 47 more than January of last year.

The usual reports were also presented by the school nurse and the attendance officer, showing that they had been very active in their work.

Chairman W. H. Godwin presided at the meeting and the other members present were Trustees W. J. C. Allen, W. R. Allen, F. R. Anglin, T. G. Bishop, L. T. Best, Rev. J. D. Boyd, W. M. Campbell, J. B. Cooke, J. G. Elliott, James Henderson, Canon J. W. Jones, T. W. Mills, Miss E. L. Mowat, Mrs. A. Newlands, H. F. Norman, W. J. Renston.
