ONE OF THE BEST.

Introducing Joseph Smith, star left wing man with Frontenacs Intermediate O.H.A. team, truly one of the best players in the game, not only in Kingston, or in Ontario, but anywhere.

"Joe" was born in Portsmouth about the time when Cunningham and Reynier were playing for Frontenacs and "Captain" Curtis for Queen's. It was on the famous Hatter's Bay and in Rockwood rink that he learned most of his hockey, as many other fine players have before and after him.

His first excursion in a league fixture was with the Portsmouth junior juvenile team, a collection of young

stars who clinched the championship three times in succession in the years 1910-11 and 1912. Then he graduated to the senior juvenile and played in that series with Portsmouth in 1913.

In 1914 "Joe" first went into O.H.A. circles with junior Frontenacs. The war interfering, he joined up with the Canadian Mounted Rifles and was captain of their intermediate O.H.A. team in Hamilton in the winter of 1915.

On his return he joined up with the Hamilton Rowing Club in the junior Northern League, they winning the championship. In the same year "Joe" represented Hamilton on an All-Star team which played in Toronto towards the end of the season.

In the years 1916-17, he, like so many young athletes, was across the water with the "troops."

On his return he joined up with Kingston Frontenacs and has played with them since 1918, going to the

finals with the team in the years 1918 and 1919.

As for "Joe" personally, he is a quiet fellow, neither too large nor too small, good-natured and always ready with a smile, and a general favorite with the females on account of being blessed with good looks usually so rare in athletes.

He has a reputation for being one of the cleanest players on the ice, and is liked equally well by players of his own and other teams and officials. The fans worship him.

FANS DISAPPOINTED

With Style of Hockey Played by Queen's Juniors.

Dozens of local fans are up in arms about the style of hockey played by Queen's juniors in the game against St. Andrew's on Wednesday night. It was not that the players themselves did not try hard but their style of hockey was very strange indeed.

When playing baseball, if one team gets players on the bases and the opposing team running all over the field in bewilderment, are the players ordered to remain on the bases till the team in the field gathers itself together again? In boxing if you hand a man a stiff jab with your left and see that he is shaken, do you withhold the right till he comes around again? In rugby, when you have busted the other team's line-up, do you keep the man with the ball at a stand-still till the opposing line reforms? The answer to all these questions is obvious.

Then why, when Queen's juniors rush and have their opponents greatly bewildered, do they leave the puck in the corner and, skating back to centre ice, calmly wait until the other team gathers itself together and forms up in perfect combination order for a rush? The answer we do not know, and therefore cannot tell the dozens of fans who have been asking.

Queen's juniors must know something about hockey or they would not be group winners, but most of the poor, uninitiated fans in Kingston, (which city, of course, has never seen hockey before) must admit that this new style is away over their heads.

Australia Wants Visit.

Canada should send athletes to Australia and thus help to seal the bond of fellowship between the two dominions," said O. G. H. Merrett, honorary secretary of the Australia Olympic Council, who has arrived at Vancouver on a business trip. He declared that there was a feeling in the Commonwealth that Canada should fall in line with New Zealand, South Africa and the United States and other countries and send her quota of athletes to Australia. A Canadian team would receive a hearty welcome.

TOMMY GIBBONS FEELS HE HAS EARNED RIGHT TO BATTLE GOOD ONES

Tom Gibbons, St. Paul light-heavyweight, who has won by a knockout in twenty of his last twenty-two bouts, is ready now for any one.

Eddie Kane, his manager, said that he would talk business with any heavyweight in the country. He wants Bill Brennan, Gene Tunney, Harry Greb, Bob Roper, or any opponent suggested by any promoter.

"We have been accused of building up a reputation on set-ups. We have been meeting what looked like easy marks, but we had to. None of the good ones will give us a chance. We can prove it now by issuing a challenge to any of them," Kane said.

Speaking of reports that Carpenter wants Gibbons to win the American light-heavyweight championship before he comes back to America for his contracted bout, Kane said he would be willing to meet the Frenchman's wishes.

"I would be willing to sign a bout with Gene Tunney, the winner to meet Carpenter for the world's title," he said. "If Tunney should beat Gibbons I would be willing to turn our contract over to him because he would be more deserving of it."

Several promoters have been talking to Kane about a Gibbons-Tunney meeting for this summer. Kane is willing, but the former soldier fighter has not committed himself.

"Gibbons now is right for any heavyweight in America outside of the champion. I would not consider a match now with Dempsey, but I feel that within another year he will be ready for the champion.

"Dempsey is a great fighter and a real champion, but I'm afraid he isn't getting enough work. It isn't his fault, of course. Circumstances are against him because the field against him lacks so much class," Kane said.

Tex Rickard, as well as Kane, believes that Carpenter will slip out of his contract to meet Gibbons or any other good American fighter. The Frenchman, since his fight with Cook, has been making all kinds of new stipulations about his contract. Apparently he is looking for a hole to get out.

Run of 4,885 at Billiards.

Raymond Imig, an athlete at Illinois Wesleyan University, has made a new record of 4,885 straight points in straight rail billiards. He made the remarkable run at three days of play. On the first day he totalled 3,006, five points more than the mark formerly accepted as the world's record.

Jack Johnson Denied.

A boxing exhibition by Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion, scheduled to be given as part of a show in a Kingston, N.Y. theatre, was forbidden by Attorney-General Newton, because Johnson had not been licensed as a boxer by the State Athletic Commission.

The veteran Dan Howley has signed his contract to continue as coach of the Detroit pouters and assistant to Manager Ty Cobb. Soccer is going big in Baltimore, fully 10,000 people attending a recent game there between Baltimore and Washington.

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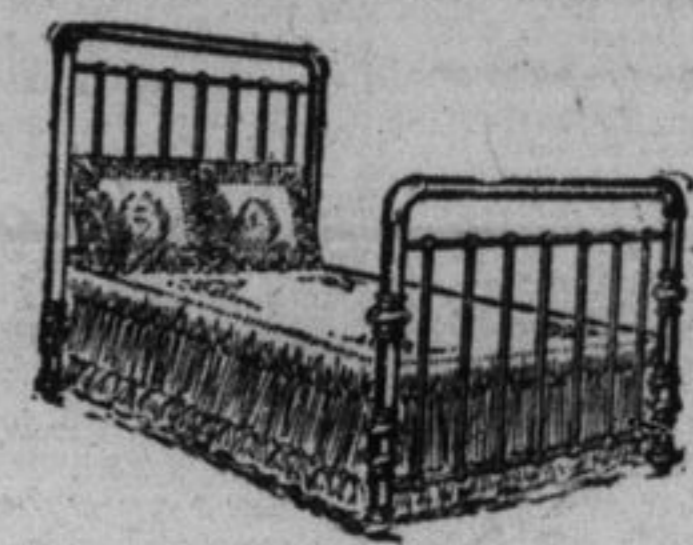
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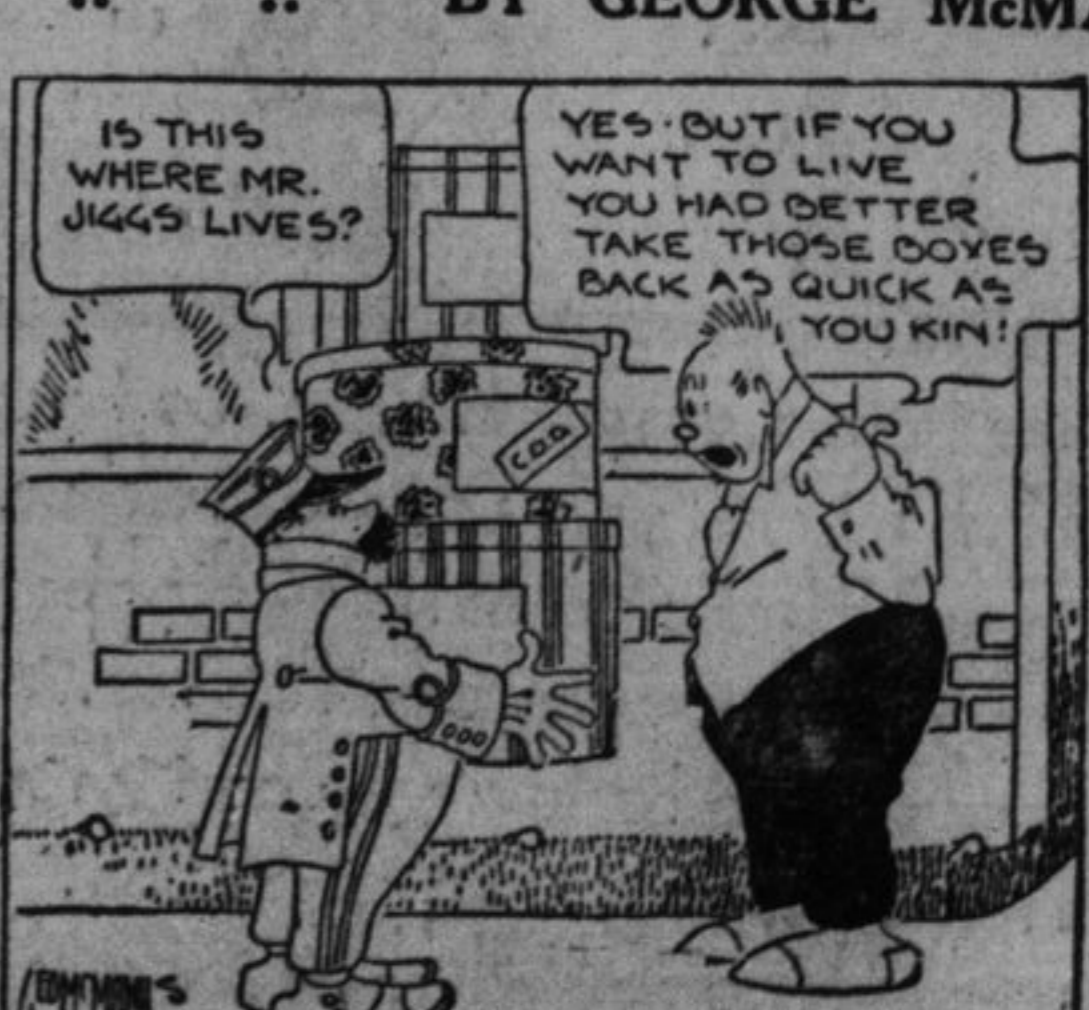
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
