CLOTHING IS DISTRIBUTED

To Many in Need—More Help Needed and It is Invited.

The effectiveness of the unemployment relief committee is little understood by the large majority of citizens, but those who desire to know what is being done in the way of substantial help in the form of warm winter clothing for men, women and children have but to call at the Community rooms in the basement of the city hall, King street entrance, any day of the week. Here Miss Oberndorfer, a zealous social worker and convener of the committee, is in charge of the distribution of wearing apparel, consisting of underwear, shoes, stockings and dresses for women and children, and suits for men and boys. Two rooms are partly filled with garments gathered in from every part of the city, and from people of all classes, who felt the appeal on behalf of the less fortunate.

Miss Oberndorfer is in charge of a score of women who devote the afternoon and evening of each Wednesday to repairing and making over apparently worthless articles of underwear for children. It is wonderful what they can accomplish, and citizens who have accumulated discarded underwear should make it up into bundles and send it to Miss Oberndorfer, Community rooms, City Hall. It will be thankfully received and properly utilized. No matter how old such articles are they can be put to good use. Miss Oberndorfer has a splendid system. She records all articles received, and when they are given out an entry is made showing how they are disposed of. All persons requiring help in the form of women's and children's shoes, clothing coats and hats and men's underwear, trousers, coats or boots are required to call personally and get fitted for the articles are only intended to be distributed among those who actually require them and who are to wear them.

There is a shoemaker who gives so many hours a week to repairing the shoes and remaking rubbers, for he is a vulcanizer as well and can make old rubbers like new ones. Miss Oberndorfer wants the loan of two sewing machines for the workshop and if there are any citizens who can possibly spare a machine for the cause it will be taken good care of and returned in good condition. 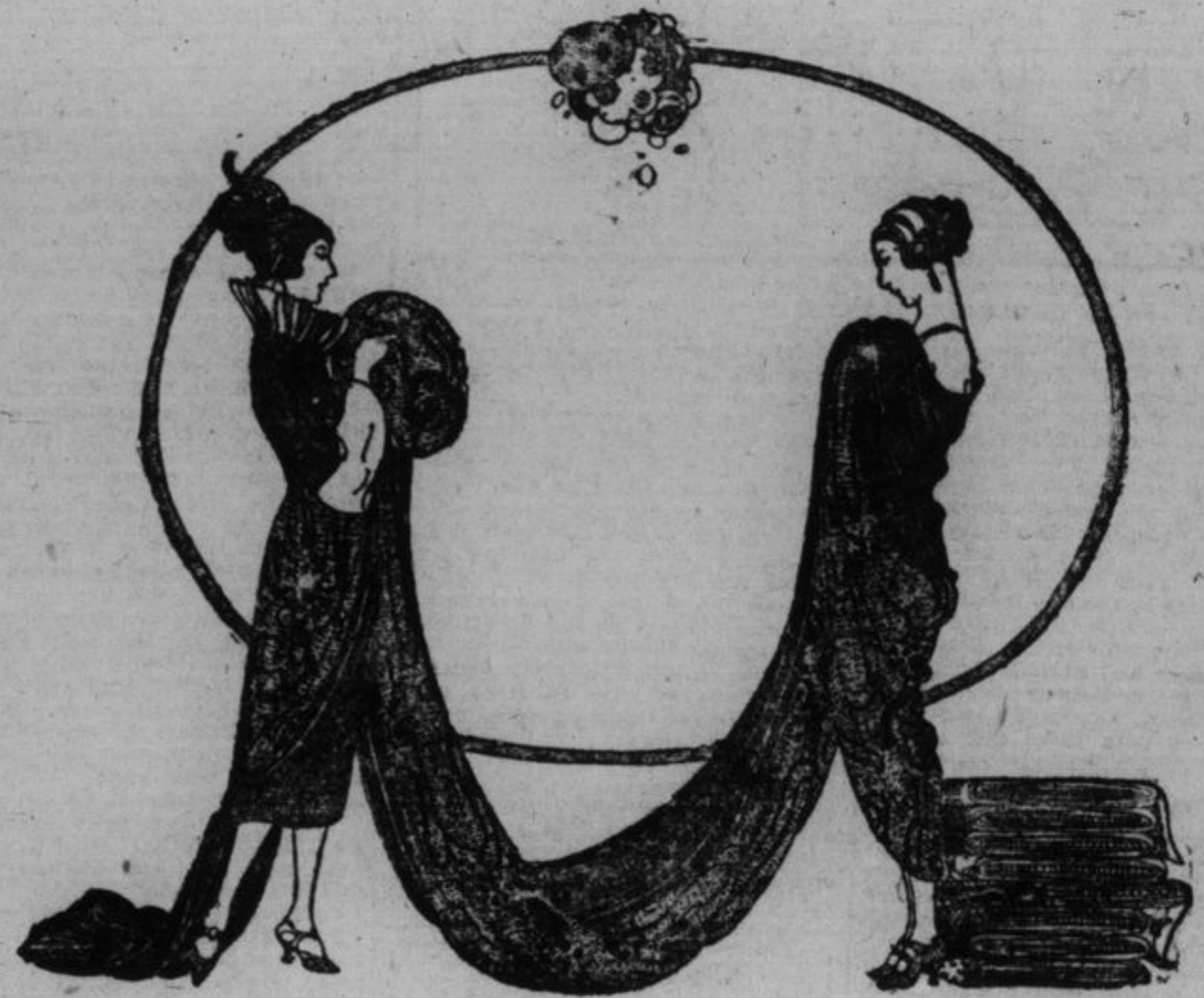
Close Night Offices.

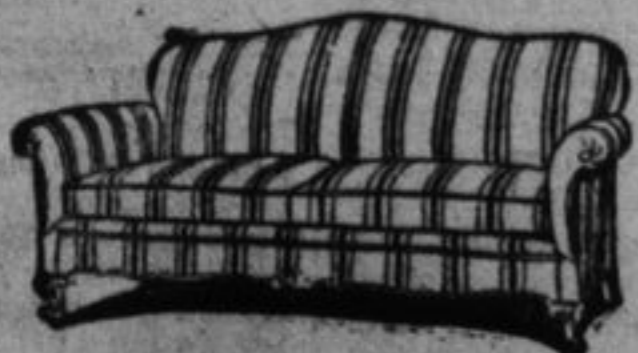
