### VERY UNFORTUNATE.

Says Justice Rose Regarding Publication of Upton's Confessions.  
E. Bayly, K.C., deputy attorney-general, opposed the application by C. M. Smith before Justice Rose in Toronto on Tuesday, on behalf of Erwood and Sherwood Upton, charged with Fred Bryant with the murder of Constable Beard at Napanee, for change of the place of trial so that it might be held anywhere the court might direct, but not at Napanee.

Mr. Smith referred to the alleged confession by the two Upton boys, to the effect that Bryant had done the shooting. This "confession", which had been handed to the magistrate at the preliminary hearing, had appeared in the two Napanee papers and had gone into practically every home in the county.

"If it is not admissible as evidence," commented Justice Rose, "if it has been read before the trial by everyone likely to be called as a juror, it is a very unfortunate state of affairs."

"There is not very much in the statement," declared Mr. Bayly, who pointed out that the place of trial was rarely changed in criminal cases. "It means this," said Mr. Smith, "that if it is true, the two Upton boys will hang."

According to him, the "confession" admitted a career of crime extending over years. Judgment was reserved.
