BUY U.S. HAY AND COAL CHEAPER THAN IN CANADA

What Wolfe Islanders Are Doing—Road Good to Watertown, N.Y.

Wolfe Island, Feb. 17.—Even the busy little bee is liable to make mistakes as evidenced a few days ago on the island, when a hive of busy honey gatherers fared forth from the winter retreat, evidently believing the warm atmosphere to be genuine spring. However, the bees did not go far before they realized their mistake. Then they returned in double quick time and judging from the antics of the little workers they will not be fooled into repeating the performance until the warble of the spring bird assures them that spring is here.

Many farmers on the island have for some time past been engaged in a work that has never before been repeated, that of hauling loose and pressed hay from the Americans. Much of the loose product is sold on the Kingston market.

Island farmers delivered in the city last week two carloads of pressed hay from Cape Vincent, consigned to the Greenlee Bros., Pittsburg township, the consignee being F. Constance, Cape Vincent. After paying two dollars a ton for cartage, a profit still remains for the shippers.

The Cape Vincent chop mill for grinding all kinds of feed has been doing a good trade with islanders so far this winter. The feed mills in the city charge fifteen cents a hundred, while the United States citizen charges ten cents for the same amount, and as a result the Kingston trade is lessened very materially.

Another commodity that has been handled in large quantities this winter is coal, and of a grade that is far superior in quality to what we are accustomed to receive. The price paid is \$13.25 a ton, exchange being only about two and a half cents on the dollar. It can be readily seen what an inducement islanders have in trading with their American cousins in coal.

A very unusual sight and one that has never been noticed to any extent before is the condition of ice and absence of snow on roads, that makes it possible for motor cars to make the trip from Watertown to Kingston across the American channel by way of Point Alexander for Kingston. Several American touring cars have crossed the island lately. The local doctors have not discarded their motor cars this winter and are able with the use of same to visit their patients in all parts of the island. Considerable sickness prevails on the island at present.

CAPTAIN GOES TO JAIL ON NEGLIGENCE CHARGE

In Connection With Sinking of Oliver Mowat and Loss of Three Lives.

Appearing at Picton before County Judge McLean, charged with criminal negligence in connection with the sinking of the Oliver Mowat and loss of three lives on Sept. 1st of last year. Capt. Whitley of the steamer Keywest, which collided with the schooner, pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to twenty-one days' imprisonment.

The accident, which occurred off the Main Duck, caused the drowning of Capt. T. L. Vandusen, Picton, Mate Jacob Corby, Deseronto, and the cook, Miss Carrie McGuigan. One of the sailors who was saved, John Minaker, Picton, has died since. Capt. Whitley has already had his captain's certificate cancelled.

Fraser King, K.C., Kingston, appeared for the prisoner, and Crown Attorney Allison prosecuted. Capt. Whitley is only twenty-eight years of age.

Fred Gildner, the right wing man of the Kitchener intermediate hockey team, and second mate of the Keywest, who will appear on the same charge, has arrived in Picton for his trial.

Puritans Hard Drinkers Declares Dr. C. W. Elliot

Boston, Mass., Feb. 20.—The Puritans were hard drinkers, Dr. Charles W. Elliot, president emeritus of Harvard, wrote the legislative committee on legal affairs.

The committee is holding hearings on bills which would harmonize the state liquor laws with the eighteenth amendment.

"People that know nothing about the Puritans often say that the Puritans were joy-killers," Dr. Elliot wrote. "Some of their religious dogmas tended in that direction, but the Puritans were hard drinkers and their descendants still illustrate the evil consequences."

Paris Police on a Hunt For "Squiri Gun" Maniac

Paris, Feb. 20.—A special squad of police were assigned to run down an "acid squirt-gun" maniac who has terrorized the downtown shopping district. More than three hundred women have been attacked by the maniac, whose method of attack is injecting hydrochloric acid upon the clothing and rich furs of women in the crowded downtown streets. Many thousands of dollars worth of clothing has been ruined and in several cases the acid has burned the flesh of the victims.

3,200 Taxies of the Marne Retired From Service


Paris, Feb. 20.—Thirty-two hundred of the old "veteran of the Marne" taxicabs have been retired from service, after sheltering about Paris for the past fifteen years. They participated in the famous dash to the Marne in 1914, when General Gallieni mobilized a fleet of Paris taxies to carry his army in the great flanking movement which contributed to the saving of Paris.
