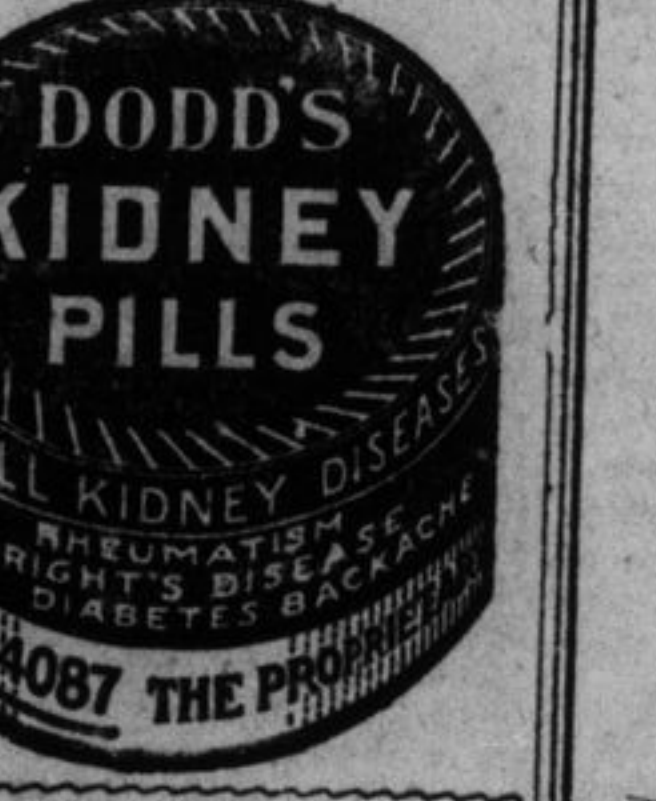
these Kingston friends of the college who possess at least some knowledge of the native tongue of sunny France.
