William C. Thompson Served Fifteen Years in British Army.

William C. Thompson, now of Watertown, N. Y., who lived in Kingston for some time, has the proud record of having served fifteen years in the British army, and three years with the Northwest Mounted Police. He is now seventy years of age and in his period of service under the British colors, Mr. Thompson was stationed in Scotland, Ireland, in the Mediterranean, in Canada, and the West Indies. He has travelled far and has seen much, but through it all has remained hearty as many a man half his years.

Mr. Thompson lived in Kingston after retiring from the Northwest Mounted Police, and was a member of a band of local musicians who played all over this part of the country.

The urge to join the British colors came early to Mr. Thompson, and he came by it honestly, for his father. when he was born, was serving with the 29th Worcestershire Regiment, in India, in the Punjab valley.
