Great Britain and the United States, both great exporting nations, have almost ceased exportation, first, because of the difficulty of securing cash markets; secondly, because the exporters are finding that they cannot export goods profitably; and, lastly, because these countries cannot compete with the prices of the European nations which are producing goods with labour paid a low rate of wages in a greatly depreciated ourrency. Canada is in exactly the same position, and, for these same reasons, the export trade annot be built up quickly enough to meet the present situation.
