## OBITUARY

The Late Mrs. John Thornton.

On March 4th, at her late residence, 73 Colborne street, there passed away somewhat suddenly, one of Kingston's oldest and most respected citizens, Mrs. John Thornton, at the ripe age of eighty-five years. The deceased lady was born in Belfast, Ireland, and came to Canada in 1846.

The sailing vessel in which she arrived had an exciting voyage lasting four months across the ocean, having partially lost its way and reaching land when the passengers and crew were threatened with starvation. The late Mrs. Thornton resided in Kingston and vicinity for seventy-six years and was one of the oldest and most devoted members of Cooke's Presbyterian church having become connected with it when a young girl.

She was a most regular and faithful worker in the church, maintaining her interest in it till the last. For a number of years she carried on a successful business in Princess street, and by hard work, capability and integrity, won the respect of the public and made many abiding friendships. The sympathy of many citizens is extended to her daughter, Mrs. Robert Percival, and other surviving relatives. The funeral took place Monday afternoon to Cataragui cemetery, Rev. W. Taylor Dale officiating. Many beautiful floral tokens were received.

## UNDERWEAR NEEDED.

For Children of All Ages, Victorian Nurses Report.

The Victorian Order of Nurses executive met on Thursday, with a good attendance. The nurses' report showed 509 visits made during February, 150 social service visits, 164 infants' visits, and 43 telephone consultations.

Since the first of the year the nurses have been taxed to the utmost, and an extra nurse was needed for a time.

The Rotary Club has made it possible for the nurses and Mrs. Gimblett to supply boots and stockings to over 200 children, who would have otherwise gone without.

Through the donations of money from generous friends, cereal, cocoa, soup and other diets have been supplied to sick patients who are unable to procure necessary nourishment. Milk tickets are given out by the nurses for children, and underfed and undernourished mothers. Baby clothes, bedding and clothes have been given to needy ones.

The V.O.N. nurses work in close touch with the unemployment and poor relief committees, to whom cases of want and distress are referred, and who in return have referred cases who require nursing care. There is at present a great need for underwear for children of all ages.
