DR. VOLUME ELECTED PRESIDENT OF G.W.V.A.

The Association Contemplates Building a Fine New Club House Here.

The annual meeting of the Kingston branch of the Great War Veterans' Association was held in the assembly room of the association on Monday evening, with a splendid attendance of members. A number of enthusiastic addresses were given, in which the progress of the association during the past year was related, as well as the prospects for expansion and improvement in the year 1922. The speakers, including Comrades Connor, McLaren, W. F. Smith, Warburton, Fowler, Volume, Bowler and Susman, were all received with applause, denoting the sound note of optimism prevailing among the members of the organization, and their belief in the policies as outlined by the incoming executive and officials.

After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read and approved, with Comrade W. Susman in the chair, the secretary-treasurer, Comrade C. H. McLaren read the financial statement for the past year, showing the following main facts:

This statement showed the remarkable progress made by the organization under an efficient and hard-working governing body last year, and with equally strong officers for the coming year, the members are satisfied that the association will continue to prosper.

The retiring president, Comrade W. Susman, gave a brief address, outlining the improvements rendered in the various departments, and he eulogized the work of the officials and executive who had ably supported him in his policy of re-entrenchment. He discussed the same management inaugurated in the canteen and poolroom; the drive for membership; the success of the poppy day; and similar functions; and told of his ambition to build up the organization to the very highest plane. Comrade Susman concluded by setting forth plans for a well-equipped club-house to be constructed as soon as the association was on a sound financial footing.

The election of officers for 1922 then proceeded, resulting as follows:

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring officers for their splendid work during the past year in which they had built up the association to its present high standing. A pleasing incident in the meeting took place when Comrade Susman was presented with a handsome gold pin by Comrade Volume on behalf of the members of the association. Comrade C. J. Holland officiated at the piano during the evening, and his selections were greatly appreciated by the audience.

TO ERECT STEEL POLES ON ONTARIO STREET

For Electrical and Telegraph Wires in Connection With Road Paving.

The Utilities Commission, at its meeting on Monday afternoon, instructed the general manager to proceed at once with the changing of the power lines on Ontario street so as to enable the work of road paving to begin on the first of April. About twenty-five steel poles have to be erected to carry the various wires, including those of the street railway and telegraph companies.

T. G. Bishop was given the contract to supply manholes, and his tender for the purchase of fifteen tons of scrap iron on the utilities premises was accepted.

Chairman R. F. Elliott and Commissioner Thomas Hewitt were appointed to attend the annual meeting of the Ontario Municipal Electrical Association which meets in Toronto on the 21st instant.

It is stated that they came into the hotel and asked permission to use the telephone. They were given the permission and were told that it was a pay station, but the men stated that they knew all about this. They were in the pay station some time, and even after coming out, they had the nerve to stay around the hotel. In fact, they remained so long that the night porter asked them if they wanted a room but the men stated that as it was late they did not want to go to their room in the north end of the city, but asked permission to stay in the hotel lobby for a short time. They were allowed to stay, and shortly after the men left, the robbery was discovered.
