**Wants Road to Renfrew.**  
R. F. Bunting, president of the Black Donald Graphite Co., Ltd., has been in Toronto seeing the provincial government department about the desirability of an improved road from the company's mines to Calabogie, a distance of about fourteen miles, so as to facilitate the company in shipping their product. The mines were discovered in 1895, and 10 years later a big plant was built for the refining of graphite. In 1903 the company which Mr. Bunting represents took over the concern and installed a new process of refining which had been used in Alabama.

**Urge Building of Bridge.**  
A petition addressed to the minister of public works and highways of Ontario is being circulated among the residents of Deseronto, East Hastings and North Prince Edward counties, asking that the provincial government construct and maintain a bridge over the Bay of Quinte to connect the provincial county highway running from Deseronto to the ferry and from the ferry to Picton. The petition is being generally signed, and, if successful, a serious block to the natural course of business and

travel between the two counties will be relieved.

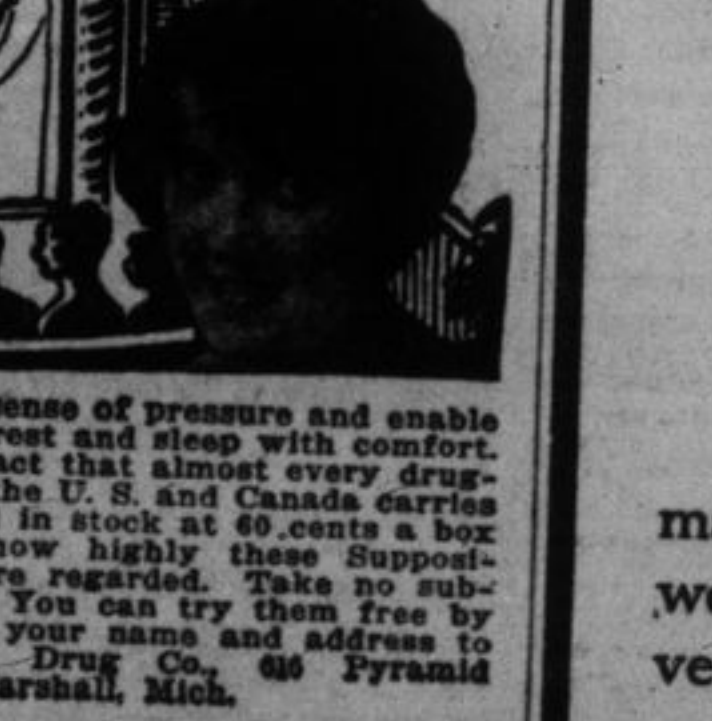
