In 1920 there were 935 and last year the total was 531.

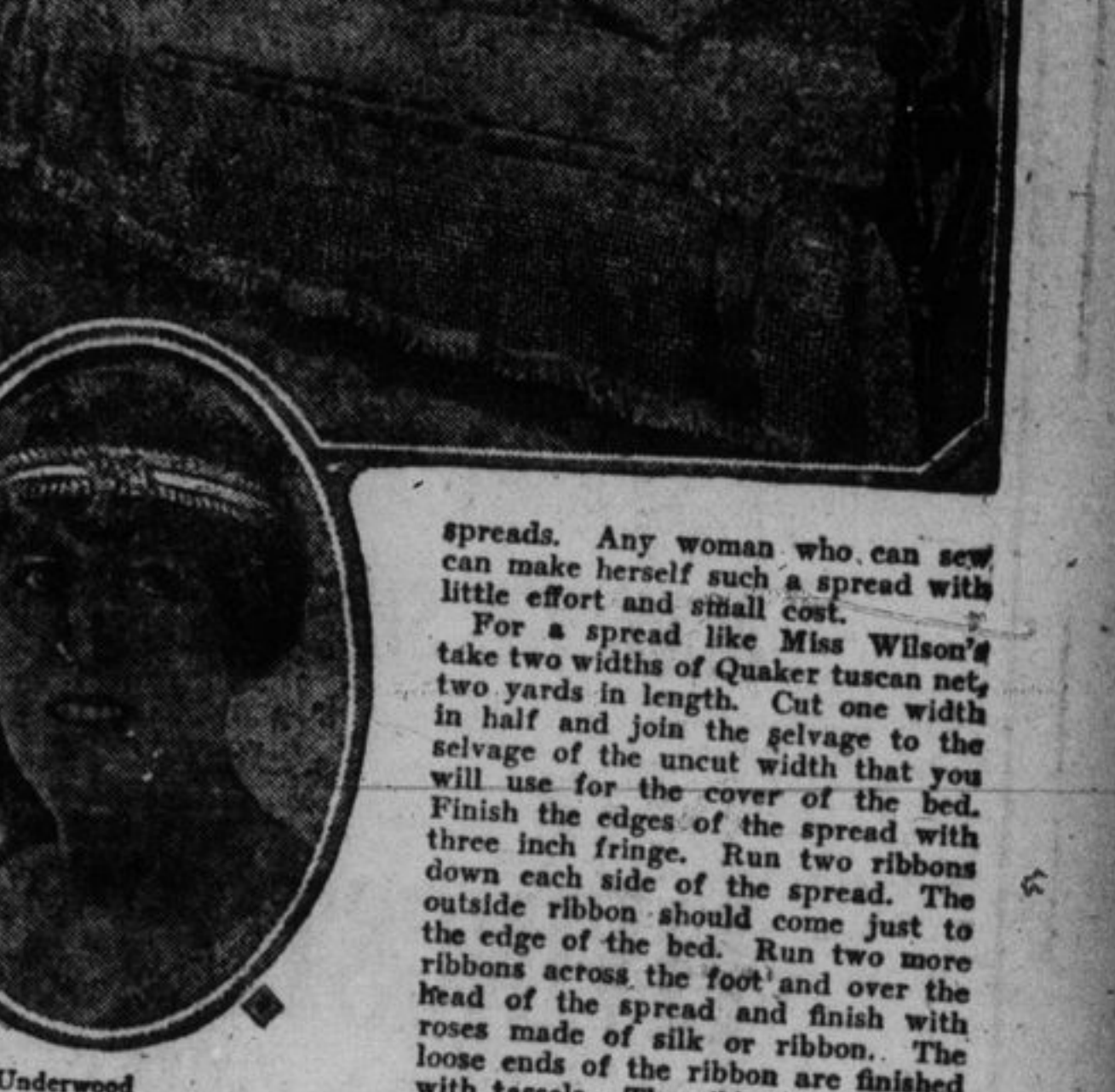
