establishment of the regiment is to-
day limited to 250.

nurse by profession.

Seeks Grant for Road.
The condition of the main high-
way between Tichborne and Sharbot
Lake is being brought before the
highway commission of the Ontario
government by the Addington county
member, W. D. Black, M.P.P. For
years this piece of road has been
difficult to travel at times, on ac-
count of the very bad condition of
the road-bed. It is expected that the
Ontario government will grant a
sum of money to help cover the ex-
pense of rebuilding it.

Position Still Vacant.
The position of chief farm instru-
tor at the Portsmouth penitentiary is
still vacant, and there is not a qual-
ified superintendent available to plan
the work for the coming season. It
has been learned that there are sev-
eral applicants for the position, but
graduates of the Ontario Agricultural
College decline to accept it be-
cause of the small salary, and the
lack of scope, owing to interference
with, and the subordination of, farm-

of the system in vogue.
