The merger of the Merchants' Bank with the Bank of Montreal having become effective, it is announced that the Perth branch of the Merchants bank will remain open under the same management. After March 31st this branch will be known as the Herriott and Gore street branch of the Bank of Montreal.

Eggs 22 Cents a Dozen.
The price of eggs continues to drop. On Saturday eggs sold for as low as 33 cents a dozen. A representative of the Whig purchased some eggs from parties out near Enterprise for 22 cents a dozen. It is expected that eggs will retail for as low as 20 cents a dozen in the very near future.

Wins Another Prize.

He pointed out that the minimum salary for a town of this population was \$1,000. The request was referred by the council to the finance committee.

Trumppours, Tweed, succeeded in removing a pane of glass and entering William Hardy's shoe repairing shop. They were seen by Mrs. F. Gerald and her daughter, who were returning home after meeting the train. Mrs. Gerald immediately gave the alarm but before the arrival of Constable Godfrey, the marauders had made their get-away with two pairs of boots and a large quantity of rubber heels.

A "Screeching Student."
The Whig is in receipt of still further complaints about the "screeching student," a young man known in the vicinity of Frontenac, Johnston and Alfred streets, who is alleged to make a practice of screeching on the streets at night and causing serious disturbance to residents. A short time ago, a man lay dying with cancer, and a woman hovered between life and death for many weeks. Night after night these sufferers, put to sleep after hours of patient work on the part of the faithful nurse, would be awakened by this night hoodlum, who would pass the house giving his ear-splitting yell. The man who was sick died, but the woman is still an invalid. Both were subject to needless hours of torture by the "screech-

ing student," and sick children and tired workmen have had their rest disturbed.

A Play at Stella.

Accident to J. M. Brown.
On Monday last, J. M. Brown met with a painful accident. One of employees of the Brown Arm, William Nero, was removing the snow from the tower of the roof of Zion church and it was thought advisable to remove the winter's accumulation of snow and ice from the gutter back of the tower to prevent the water going through the stone wall to the interior. Nero removed the snow and was starting to loosen the ice, Mr. Brown standing on the top of a long ladder at the edge of the roof directing the work, when the ice block started to move downward. Mr. Brown hurried down the ladder to avoid the rush, but before he got half way the ice struck the ladder and knocked it over, the climber falling with it to the icy ground below, the ladder falling on top of the man. The result was a fracture of the left wrist, the bone of the right heel broken, one rib on the right side fractured and the pelvis bone cracked.
