

"The proposed harbor improvement not only provides berthing for the large fifteen thousand ton lake steamers, even in winter, but in addition to those already there another large modern elevator with storage tanks will be erected with a capacity of 3,200,000 bushels. The elevator will be capable of untoading 50,000 bushels per hour, and the track layout is such that four hundred cars can be loaded in ten hours.

Industrial.

"About two hundred acres of land will be reclaimed for industrial purposes. This addition will be of immeasurable value to future manufacturers because the easy grades to tide water will permit the economical laying of railway sidings. Besides this Kingston has many other fine sites for prospective manufacturers. These are free and accessible by rail and water and are exempt from taxa-
