

The Behavior Of The Fuel Charge Is Being Intensively Studied

IN DESCRIPTIONS OF RECENTLY designed engines the statement that their cylinders and valves are designed to secure "turbulence," is quite frequently to be noted, and a few words as to what turbulence is and what advantages it is supposed to confer, may not be amiss. The mixture within the cylinder is said to be "turbulent" when it, as a whole, is in an active condition of whirling motion and it is a pretty well established fact, that if the charge is thus whirling at the instant of ignition, the resulting combustion is much more rapid, clean and efficient and freer from violent pressure waves that cause "pinking," than when it is in a state of rest when fired. Prompt combustion means higher efficiency, due to reduced heat losses, it renders a large spark advance usnecessary and permits of high engine speeds, so that turbulence, in so far as it speeds up combustion, is desirable. Detonation or pinking has been the engine designer's bogie of late, for if an engine were given a high enough compression to insure it high theoretical fuel efficiency, if would "knock its head off" and prove a failure, when operated on asoline of current quality. It appears that, with the charge jostling sound in the clearance space, when the spark comes, moving portions d ignited gas whirl through the combustible mass, igniting it at numeros points and hastening its normal combustion, with the result that enormally high pressure waves do not have time to form and try to book off the cylinder head. No one seems to know just how turbulence factions, but it appears from experiment that higher compressions can employed, without knocking, when a turbulent mixture is provided. bw to secure energetic mass motion of the mixture at the ignition istant is the problem that engineers are now trying to solve. By suitly shaping the cylinder head and valve passages, the charge as it eters the cylinder may be given a whirling motion, but this is likely to out during the compression stroke, so in order to insure turbulent caditions at ignition time, the clearance space is shaped so that when to piston comes up on compression the charge will be forced to take up awhirling motion. Since the subject of turbulence has been under irestigation, facts have come to light to explain why some engines are tone to knock and others are not, the explanation being the absence of trbulence in the former and its presence in the latter, and by the aplication of turbulence data it is hoped that higher compression, more elcient engines can be successfully designed.

They Enable Ownership To Be Positively Established

CASE YOUR CAR is stolen, are their plenty of distinctive things at it, by which it can be positively identified and have you a record say filed away that covers all these points? Necessarily, your car and eme numbers are on record and if you carry theft insurance, further da may be available, but for the guidance of the police in recovering ca each owner should have on hand further distinctive data and set marks which can be promptly communicated to the authorities, se of theft. There are a number of accessories which generally bear set numbers, such as the carburetor, battery, horn, generator, starting me, distributor or magneto and the vacuum tank and while it is coion practice for thieves to interchange these accessories among dient stolen cars, it is nevertheless worth while to keep a record of thenumbers. Nearly every car that has been in use some time, has somminor peculiarity as to painting which should be recorded—the slier and more obscurely located the peculiarity the better. Often there bent, dented or nicked parts, which are of evidential value and anjanges which have been made that differentiate a car from others of same model are of value. QUEBEC IS TO BUILD

Additional Seven, and Half Millions To Be Spent This Year.

Quebec, March 16 .- That \$36. 915,716 had been spent in improvements of roads in the province of Quebec since 1912 was the declaration made by Hon. J. E. Perrauit, who opened the debate in the house on the new highway bill, this afternoon. Provisions are made for the appropriation of \$7,500,000 for maintenance, improvement and construction of new roads this year, powers to borrow \$5,000,000 being sought by the measure.

The acting minister of highways informed the house that there were 40,000 miles of roads in the whole province, 4,000 of which were now good roads, and when the plan of the government would be completed, 10,-000 miles of good roads would be at the disposal of the public. He contended that heavy motor trucks had been responsible for the damaged portion of roads which had brought the provincial treasurer to impose heavy taxes on such vehicles.

The provincial department of roads by the act takes under its control all regional and provincial highways, with the understanding that the government may subscribe even over 50 per cent, of the cost so as to decrease the obligations of municipalities.


