JUMPS OUT OF WINDOW

Patient At General Hospital Falls Thirty Feet, Only Breaks Arm.

Clad only in a thin shirt reaching half-way to the waist, a young man, Samuel Reid, a patient in the Kingston General hospital, jumped from a second-storey window in the west side of the Empire wing Thursday afternoon and fell almost thirty feet to the ground, and escaped with a broken arm and injured shoulder. The accident occurred about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and was witnessed by a number of workmen employed around the new service building. One of these men, in speaking to the Whig after the accident, stated that he first noticed the man poking his head through the window-glass, but only thought it a minor accident. Dumb-struck, he watched the patient break the glass, shove his shoulders through, and then jump to the ground. The unfortunate man fell head-first, and struck a heavy iron plate near a coal-shute in the building. Several of the workmen rushed to the side of the patient, who was practically naked, and a nurse flung down a blanket from the room above, in which the men wrapped him. Not a sound was uttered by the victim, though he was conscious when he was carried into the hospital.

The patient is about thirty years of age and of robust physique; a resident of Wolfe Island and had been sick in the hospital about a week. Just before the man made his spectacular jump, he had been attended by an orderly, who had left the patient lying quietly in bed. When the orderly re-entered the room, Reid was standing upright in bed, and gesticulating wildly. The attendant sprang to the side of Reid, but was flung off by the delirious patient, who jumped on the window-sill, broke the window and pumped to the ground below.

The patient is now resting quietly in his room at the hospital, though carefully watched. It is believed that the man was only in a temporary state of delirium, as a result of his illness, which was not of a serious nature. He was indeed fortunate to escape with such comparatively slight injuries, as the jump from such a height might easily have ended fatally.

CASE WAS POSTPONED

To Allow the Accused to Secure a Lawyer.
George Jeffrey, alias Jackson, of Kingston Mills, appeared before Justice of the Peace J. W. Bradshaw at the court house on Friday morning, charged "that he did unlawfully and without color and right take and steal three traps with floats, the property of the plaintiff, Donald J. Graham." When the case was called at ten o'clock there was no sign of Mr. Jeffrey, so the court had to wait for about half an hour for him to appear. When the charge was read, the accused entered a plea of "not guilty" and asked the permission of the court to allow a clergyman to present his case. The magistrate advised him that no person could present a case in court except a member of the bar, and agreed to call a Kingston lawyer on the telephone if Mr. Jeffrey would suggest who he would like. Jeffrey asked for an adjournment and so Mr. Bradshaw consented to call off the hearing until two o'clock on Friday afternoon. The court room was filled with people who were anxious to hear the case.
