Surviving are one sister, Miss Jennie and three brothers, Robert, Montreal, and James and D. A., this city. The funeral took place from the residence of her brother, D. A. Shaw, Bagot street, to Cataract cemetery, Saturday morning, Rev. Taylor Dale officiating.

**The Late Edward M. Ketcheson**  
About a month ago Edward M. Ketcheson, whose home was at Pilot, Mich., travelled to Belleville and vicinity to visit relatives and friends. Shortly after he was taken ill and despite every medical attention passed away on Thursday at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Hozelton, Front of Sidney. Deceased and was a son of the late D. R. Ketcheson and was born in the 5th concession of Sidney about seventy-three years ago.

**Died at Cape Vincent, N.Y.**  
Angus B. Gibson died Saturday at his farm home just south of the Cape Vincent, N.Y., fair grounds, following a long illness. Mr. Gibson was born on Wolfe Island, Aug. 5th, 1879, and was the youngest son of the late David and Fanny Horne Gibson. On Feb. 8th, 1911, he married Edna L. ### THE DURATION OF WINTER
