ENGLISH RACING SEASON.

The Grand National Handicap Big Event on March 24th.

London, March 18.—Although the flat racing season in England opens with the three-day meet at Lincoln, commencing Monday, March 20th, the big event on the English turf for that week is the Grand National Handicap, the blue riband of the chasing world, and which is always decided over the historic Aintree course at Liverpool during the first week of the flat racing season. The date for this event this year is Friday, March 24th.

The Grand National with its difficult jumps—there are thirty of them that must be negotiated in the four and one-half miles that the course covers—is indeed a severe

test of speed, strength and stamina in the thoroughbred, and so great is the tax on the staying qualities of a horse that on an average only two-thirds of the horses that start are able to finish the race. On several occasions the number of horses that finished was much less than this percentage, as, for instance a year ago when only four of the thirty-six horses that went to the post, managed to cross the finishing post. This record was eclipsed, however, by the showing of eleven years ago, when out of a field of twenty-six starters, only one horse, Glenside, managed to finish the race without falling.

McGill May Promote Interprovincial School Games.

With a view to promoting a greater interest in rugby football among the colleges and schools of the province, the McGill Athletic Association will discuss the advisability of sponsoring games between local schools and teams from institutions outside the province. The matter was brought before the student body at a meeting when Doug. Ambridge, line plunger of the red and white intercollegiate team, suggested that the McGill Rugby Club guarantee the financial support necessary to bring the St. Andrew's School twelve, of Toronto, to Montreal for a game against the Lower Canada College squad. The proposition met with considerable support from the undergraduates and the whole idea of missionary work in rugby was referred to the Athletic Association for final decision.

Jack Dempsey May Go to Europe Next Month

Jack Dempsey will go to Europe next month with the view of fighting Georges Carpentier, it is announced. The latest lure for the heavy-weight champion is a project by C. B. Cochran, theatrical producer and fight promoter, to stage a return match with the Frenchman in one of the huge English stadiums which are capable of seating 150,000.

Suzanne Wins Match.

At Nice, France, Miss Suzanne Lenglen played her first tournament tennis since she was defeated by Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt Mallory last summer. She was paired with Count Michael Soumarokov-Eleton, former Russian champion, in the mixed doubles, and with Miss Elizabeth Ryan, of California, in the women's doubles. While the Lenglen teams won both matches, 6-0, 6-3 and 6-1 respectively, the French star failed to display her best form, and kept away from the net, being content with a back-court game.
