"Oh, I just moved a potato and there it was," triumphantly answered her latest victim.

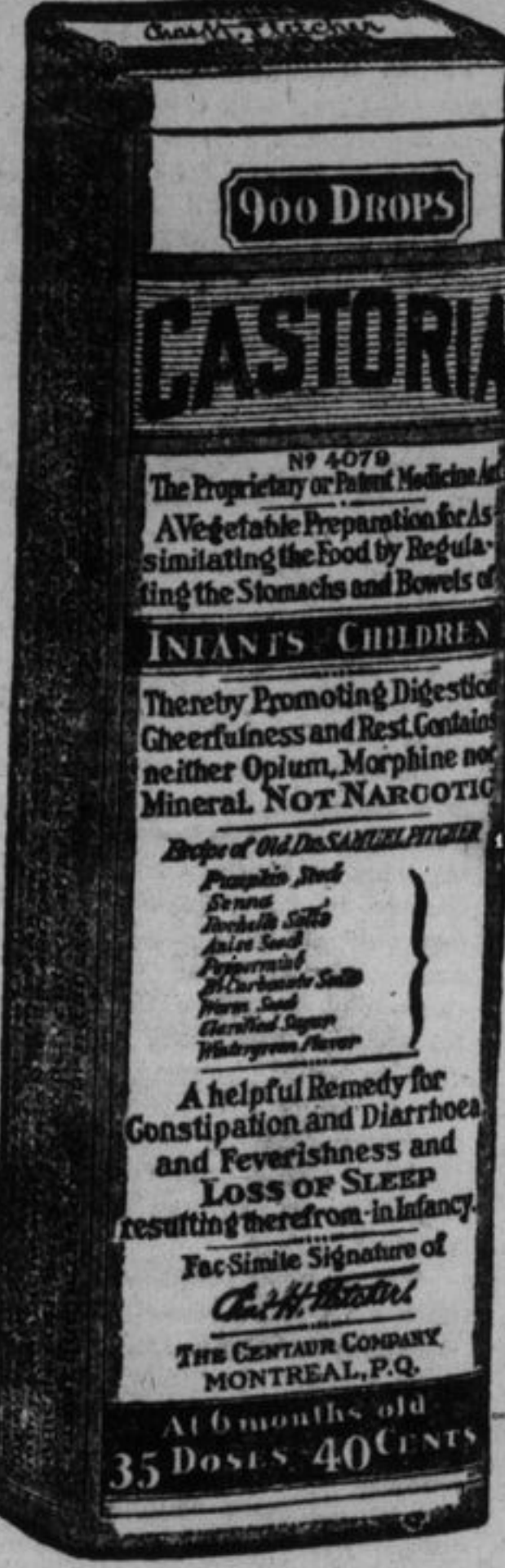
Losing Sweetness. Fruit and vegetables, which are being cultivated by British gardeners to give bigger crops, are in many instances losing their sweetness and other good qualities.
