The English section's gift was a very costly platinum scarf pin, the setting being a sapphire set with diamonds. While the Sales Manager, John A. Fraser, as a token of personal regard presented him with a solid gold watch and chain.

Clayton Well Paved Village.
The report of Clayton has just been completed and shows that the village was active during the past year. The most noteworthy activity was that of road building. During the past year nearly every street was paved and curbed. The village will by the end of this year have every street paved, something which very few other villages the size of Clayton can claim. The trustees of the village recommended that \$15,926.96 be raised to defray the ordinary expenses for 1922. Besides clerk and police expenses and bond interest there is \$3,600 for street lighting and \$2,000 for highway expenses. More than \$900 will be spent for ornamental lighting, but only \$100 for park improvement.

The programme consisted of vocal solos, male trio, and a short sketch by twelve young people dressed in old time costume entitled, "Why We Never Married," was very pleasing. Miss R. V. Refreshments were served at the close of the concert, which completed a very enjoyable evening.
