The writer of the Hebrews epistle says: "Once in the end of the age hath He ppeared to put away sin by the sacri-

tion."-Heb. IX.: 26-28. Paul's letter to the Ephesians says:
"Christ loved the church and gave Himself for it; that He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the Word, that He might present it to Himself a glorious church, not having spot or wrinkle, or any such thing, but that it should be holy and without blemish."-Ephes. VI.: 25-27. John XVI., 3, tells us plainly when He will thus present the church to Himself. "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto Myself that where I am there ye may be also."
So that both Hebrews and Ephesians clearly teach the Lord's return. Mr. Bell says that "God's eternal purpose is to make known through the church the message of the Gospel to save all men."

He evidently has in mind a passage in the Ephesian epistle, but a careful reading of that passage will reveal that something quite different is said. Let us treat God's Holy Word with the rewerence due to it and quote it correctly.
What it actually says in Ephesians
III., 10 and 11, is this: "To the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in heavenly places might be known by the church the manifold wisdom of God, according to the eternal purpose which He purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord." What the principalities and powers referred to are, can be seen in Ephesians VI., 12, where they are again mentioned. It is the wicked again mentioned. It is the wicked spiritual forces against which the true Christian wrestles, and to this whole system of organized evil. God is making known His wisdom in forming a church of those who, as guilty sinners, believe on the Lord Jesus Christ.

While it is quite true that God's present purpose is that none should perish, He saves only those who trust the mighty Saviour personally All through

mighty Saviour personally. All through the New Testament salvation is presented as conditional upon acceptance of Christ as a personal Saviour.

The intelligent believer in God's Word is not a "pessimist," but preferring the plain statements of "New Testament writers" to the pronouncements of many to-day who do not "tremble at His Word," they can see that God is doing exactly what Scripture says. He will do in this age, namely, "Visit the Gentiles to take out of them a people for His Name. To this agree the words of the prophets, as it is written, After this I will return and will build again the tabernacle of David

WILLIAM PATTERSON which is fallen down, and I will build again the ruins thereof, and I will set again the ruins thereof, and I will set it up, that the residue of men might seek after the Lord, and all the Gentiles upon whom my name is called saith the Lord who doeth all these things."-Acts XV., 14-17.

As this Scripture teaches, there will be a golden age, but if the Lord says He will bring it after the church age only, why not believe Him? Some of us who honestly want to know/and act upon the truth cannot possibly see the bright prospects for world-betterment preached by anti-pre-millenealists. They told us before the great war that education and culture had so far advanced that war was an impossibility, and lo! in a few hours war, and that the worst in history, cast its dark, devilish shadow over the world for five long years. Now they say that a new world is rising. phoenix-like, from the ashes of the war, and shortly civic, municipal, provincial, national and international righteousness will prevail. Some of us are still simple-minded and old-fashioned enough to believe that God knows best about it, and Scripture says, "For when they shall say 'peace and safety,' then sudden destruction cometh upon them.' -Thess. V.: 3.
