LOSS OF RINK HANDICAPS CLUB

The thing to figure out now is the future possibilities for curling in this city, which, for many years, has been one of the leading centres for that sport.

But what now, with the curling rink a wreck and practically an official admission from Queen's University that it would not be rebuilt? Can arrangements be made for the use of Rockwood Rink, and, if so can the two small rinks there accommodate all the curlers? It is hardly possible, as these rinks are kept busy with the Rockwood enthusiasts and the eight rinks in the building just destroyed were hardly sufficient for all the players on busy evenings during the winter.

There may be the same solution that there was for golfers when the old links were spoiled at Barriefield by the erection of Maroon stations and the blasting operations in the hillside. They got together and formed a new club, loosened up and formed a semi-business, semi-pleasure organization to start with, secured a desirable tract of land and made their own links, to which have been added one of the neatest little club houses in the country.

If the curlers could do this same thing they would be much better off than they were before. There will be no further danger from expiration of leases or excessive rents, the new structure could have many improvements in it, and in their efforts they would help the city as well as sport and themselves.
