THE MULTI-JACK.

When father is listening to the radiophone concert with the earpieces on his head, his young son, for whom he told the salesman the set was bought, is usually "out of luck."

Its twin wires connected one to each binding screw of the multi-jack and the other end of the cord connected into a plug.

The multi-jack may be easily screwed to the side of a cabinet receiver or amplifier, and its polished black surface in no way detracts from the appearance of the cabinet.

If three twin-adapters are available, all in series. The adapters are plugged into the multi-jack, and two telephone plugs may be inserted into each adapter.

This device has three automatic jacks, built into a block of insulating composition. Three pairs of telephone receivers may be plugged, one into each jack, so that they are in series with each other. A flexible cord may have

DIRECT CURRENT.

If an electrical circuit is made by connecting an ordinary dry battery, an electric bell and a push button together with copper wires, the bell rings when the button is pushed.

The dry battery has two terminals, positive and negative. When the button is pressed an electric current flows through the circuit from the positive battery terminal, through the bell and back to the negative terminal of the battery.

If an instrument were connected into the circuit to indicate the current strength, it would be found that the strength does not vary as long as the button is
