RECITAL OF BIG FIGURES

Ministers Reel Off Millions in **Answering Questions on** Order Paper.

Ottawa, April 4 .- A little Canadan Northern Railway history, as it related to the Dominion government, is contained in the answers by the Minister of Railways and Canals to three questions asked by William Irvine, East Calgary, The first cash subsidy paid to the Canadian Northern Railway by the Dominion government was on September 7, 1900. The total amount received by that railway from the Dominion government up to the time the railway surrendered control to the government was \$31,870,016.56, and the total amount of deficits paid to date by the Canadian government for the operation of the Canadian Government Railways is \$46,-

Coal for the use of Canada's railways, when imported from the United States, looks more like a luxury than a necessity when the amount of duty that must be paid is considered. In answer to a question by E. M. Macdonald, Pictou, the Minister of Railways and Canals stated that during the calendar year of 1921, 1,823,000 net tons of coal were imported from the United States for and on account of the Grand Trunk Railway, The cost at the mines of this coal was \$4,725,-000; delivered in Canada, with duty, it cost, \$11,250,000. Of this last figure there is \$963,000 for duty.

On January 31, 1922, the returned soldiers established on farms in Canada were distributed through the provinces as follows: British Columbia, 3,252; Alberta, 8,674; Saskatchewan, 7,722; Manitoba. 4,439; Ontario, 1,595; Quebec, 415; New Brunswick, 583; Nova Scotia, 402; Prince Edward Island, 334.

During the crop year of 1920-1921 the total amount of overages received by the government from terminal elevators was 98,455 bushels and 671,078 pounds of mixed grain. The total value of this was \$130,-
