## **BOXING FINALS** AT THE R.M.C.

Gardiner and Carr-Harris of Kingston Each Won His Bout.

Though not productive of as many, thrills and spectacular fighting as appeared in the preliminaries and semifinals, the finals in the annual boxing competition staged at the Rolay Military College on Saturday afternoon were nevertheless splendid exhibitions of the manly art. Perhaps the most sensational battle of the afternoon featured Gardiner and Campbell, both hard-hitting lads, which went four rounds, and during every minute of the sessions, old man Kayo was expected at any time. Gardiner won on points over one of the hardest battlers in the college. Gordon had to go the limit of his speed and clever hitting to obtain a decision over Fry; and Hughes and McLeod also put up a scientific battle, with Hughes winning by his ability to hit hard and often with his left, and to keep out of the way of punches from the enemy.

Two Kingston boys won their bouts after hard scrapping, Gardiner in the novice lightweight division, and B. C. Carr Harris in the feather class. H. G. Hughes, of Vancouver. but formerly of Kingston, defeated two good men in his bouts and carried off the titles in the middleweight and novice heavyweight divisions. There were no knock-outs in any of the bouts, but the bell came in mighty handy for several of the boys. All varieties and styles of sparring were brought to light; give and take. down-right slugging, clever footwork combined with heady fighting. the wide open kind with a heavy right and left swing, the wicked upper-cuts and jabs, intermittent hot in-fighting and watchful waiting; in fact the entire stock in trade of a boxer, good or bad, as developed from the very Dark Ages. 
