18 PRINCETON ATHLETES DECLARED INELIGIBLE

Captain of Baseball Team on List—First Victims of the Loan System.

Big brooms are working about spring house cleaning around the "big three."

Princeton started it and Yale and Harvard will have to follow it for the simple reason that Princeton puts it up to them to do the same thing.

Eighteen athletes at Princeton, by a ruling of the athletic committee, have been declared ineligible to compete in varsity sports.

Tom McNamara, captain of the baseball team and a sub end on last year's football eleven, is the only one whose name has been made public.

The committee wished to make it known emphatically today that it had not said to Yale and Harvard. "We have done our part. Now it's up to you to clean up."

The committee also insists that the stigma of professionalism does not fall upon any of the ineligible and that their honor is in no way besmirched.

While it was not admitted officially, it is generally regarded that the eighteen are the first victims of the "loan system" which works along this line:

Mr. So-and-so, a wealthy alumnus, sees a high school or prep school star at such-and-such place. He goes to him with a pat on the back and asks him where he is going to college. The boy says he has to go to work. He has no money to go to college. The kind benefactor then tells him to set aside his worries, to take the examinations at his alma mater and that the tuition will be paid and that he will be allowed so much spending money. The money that is put out on him can be paid back when he makes good in the big outside world. There are few records of those loans being called or paid.

The suspensions were the result of more than a month's quiet investigation, the committee said. The list of eighteen suspended athletes includes a few who were caught slipping by scholastic requirements also.

ONCE BOUGHT AT \$5,000

Now Sold to a Canadian for \$1,200. Lady Gratten, 2.09 1-2, which was raced on the Maritime and Maine circuit in 1919 and 1920 by A. Faulkner of Montreal, Maine, and then sold during the Northern Maine fair at Presque Isle, Maine, in 1920, to Archie Alcorn, Blackville, N.B., for \$5,000, was bid in at the recent Chicago horse sale for \$1,200 by Vic Fleming, the well-known Canadian trainer who makes his headquarters in Ontario and spends part of the racing season on the grand circuit.

Lady Gratten is now eligible to the 2.12 class, not having been raced last season and having made her record of 2.09 1-2 at the Houlton Maine fair in 1920, winning nine of her fourteen races that season. She was consigned to the Chicago sale by Thomas W. Murphy, the Poughkeepsie N.Y. Reinsman, who was said to be "acting for a patron who for some reason desired to sell at once."

Pal Moore, Memphis bantamweight, who has won newspaper decisions over the last four champions in his division, but withal has never held the title, now announces that he would turn promoter, in an effort to get a decision contract with Johnny Buff, present title holder. Montreal Woman Made Good Score at Shooting. Mrs. H. E. Moles, Montreal, who won the women's rifle tournament at Pinehurst, N.C., Gun Club, a week ago with a target of 141 out of a possible of 150, led the field again during the tourney of the present week and was awarded the first prize for a target which lacked only three points of a perfect score. Mrs. Lawrence Barr, Pittsburgh, and Rye, N.Y., took the second prize with 144 points.

Kentucky's New Track.

Kentucky's newest race track, that of the Green River Jockey Club, is to be modelled after the Devonshire Park track at Windsor, Ont. This was announced by Bradley Wilson, in charge of the construction of the new track, who is here on his way to Windsor. He plans to spend a few days at the Devonshire Park track, and will return at the end of the week.

"We are going to have a first-class race-track, modelled after the Devonshire Park plant," said Wilson, "and we will have it completed in time for racing after the close of Latonia in July, unless we have hard luck with the construction work."

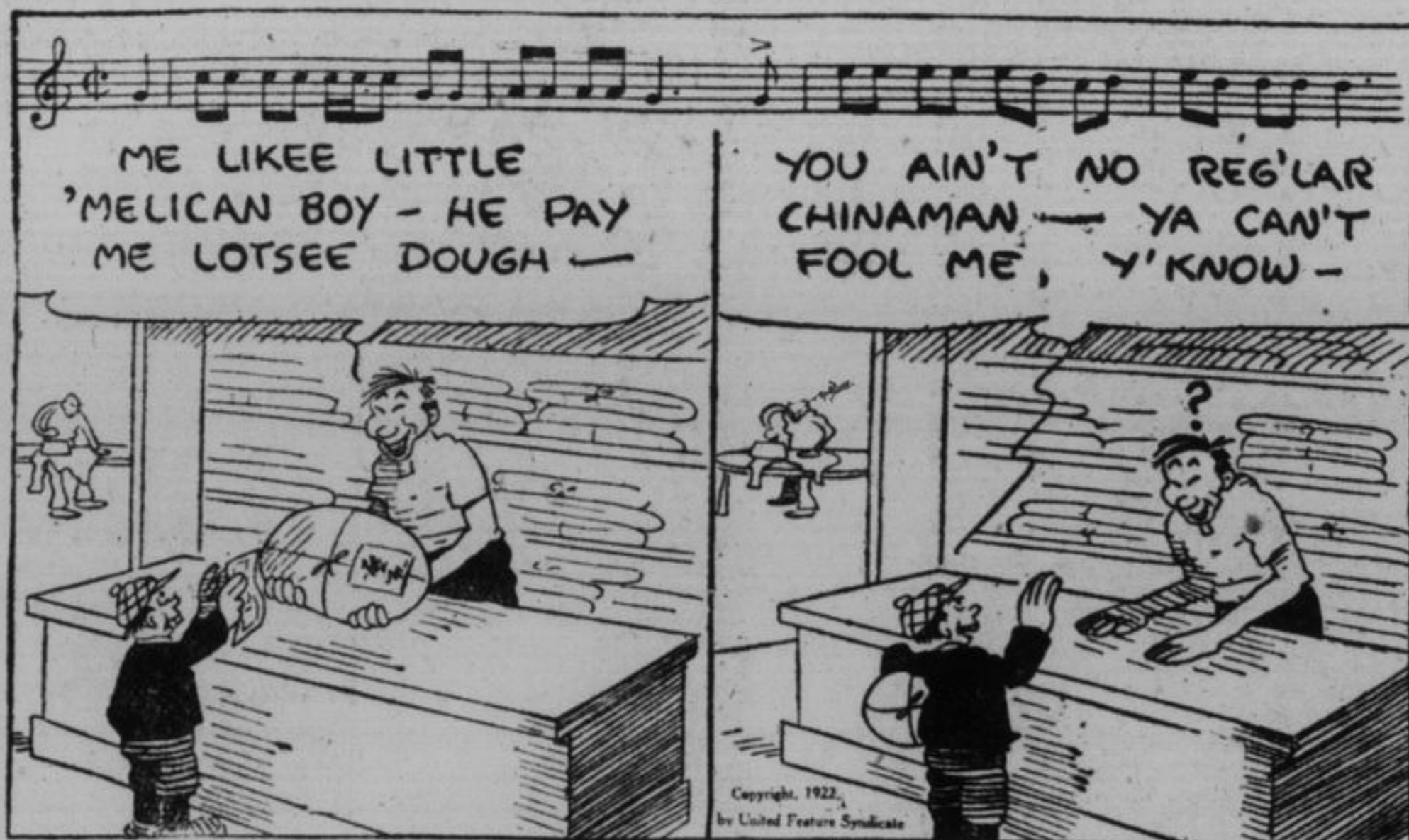
Articles of incorporation of the new racing association have been approved by the Kentucky Secretary of State.

Giants to Get Medals. For winning the world series, members of the New York Giants will receive 14-karat gold medals to be presented by Judge Landis on a date not yet decided. The medals, which are of solid gold in the form of a watch medallion, were designed by Maj. Charles J. Dieges of New York. In the centre is raised a daintily modelled figure of Victory offering the wreath of laurel. Arched above, in raised letters, is the word "Giants." Below is the inscription "World's Champions of 1921." Opposite on each side are baseball bats in miniature supporting a tiny baseball. On the lower side is an especially fine selected diamond symbolizing the great American game.

Hog Line in Lawn Bowling. For the first time the "hog" line will be introduced into the game of lawn bowling this season. At the annual meeting of the D.L.B.A. at Toronto on Saturday afternoon an amendment to the rules proposed by C. O. Knowles was unanimously passed. It provides that a bowl must be placed at least forty-five feet from the ditch line or it may be removed from the green the same as a ditcher.

George Gray, London, was in Chicago to challenge Jake Schaefer for the 18.2 title. Gray is willing to play for a purse of any amount up to \$20,000. Gray has made many billiard records in Australia. Gerald L. Patterson and O'Hara Wood won the autumn tennis championship of Australia at Melbourne.

PLAY BASEBALL IN IRELAND

To Take Teams to Dublin, London and Paris. Ted Sullivan, former Washington baseball club manager, who has conducted one or more tours of American diamond teams abroad, is arranging a tour in which two big league teams will play in the opening ceremonies of the Irish Free State at Dublin this fall. This trip will call for games not only at Dublin but in London and Paris. Sullivan will sail for the other side on the good ship George Washington on May 6th to arrange all details. Just which two teams will make the tour has not yet been decided upon and a decision probably will not be reached in this connection until the close of the coming season.

WELL KNOWN LIGHT-WEIGHT BOXER DEAD

Jabez White Was One of the Cleverest of British Fighters. Jabez White, of Birmingham, the once well known lightweight pugilist, died at Birmingham at the age of forty-five. He had been in failing health for some time, but hopes had been entertained of his ultimate recovery. White commenced boxing as a professional when only sixteen years of age and reached the finals of two open competitions at the central hall, Holborn. Later he scored most of his notable triumphs at the Olympic Club, Birmingham, where he met and defeated Harvey Checketts, Dave Wallace, Mike Sears and Billy Newell. White made two trips to the United States where he was defeated by Jimmy Britt and Joe Gans. White's last battle was at Birmingham where he attempted a "comeback" after many years' absence from the ring. On this occasion he was out-pointed by Bill Johnson, of Smethwick. When at his best White was a difficult man to beat and for several years he was regarded as one of the cleverest of British lightweights.

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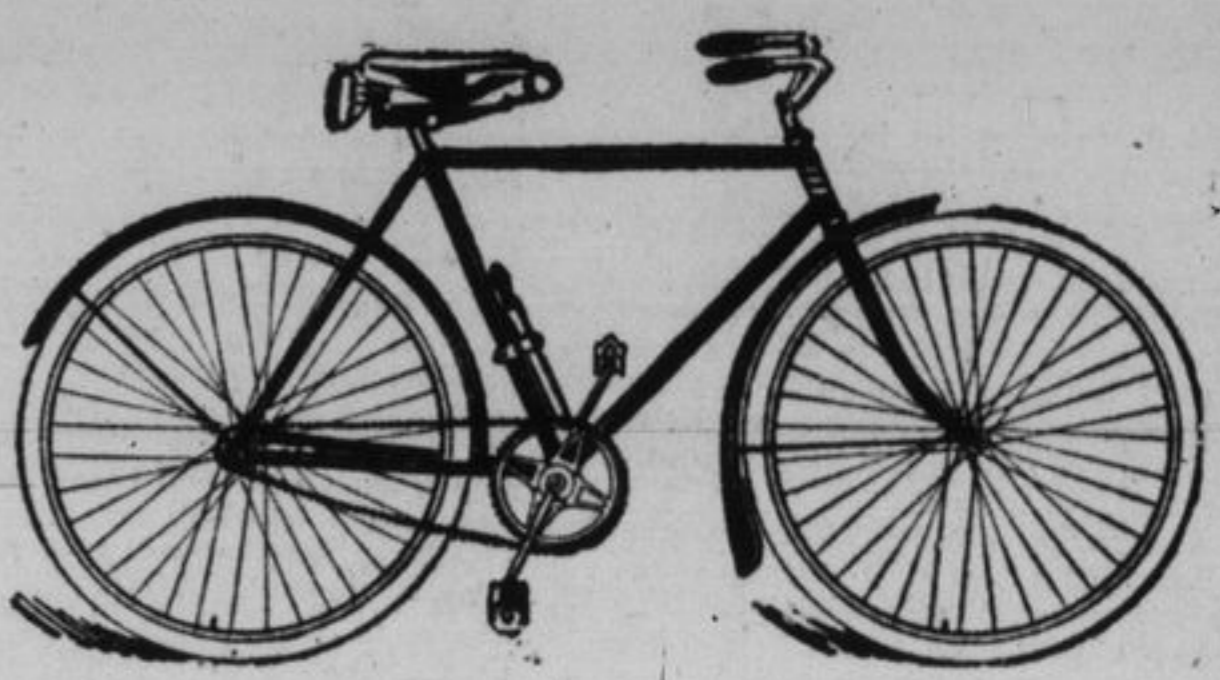
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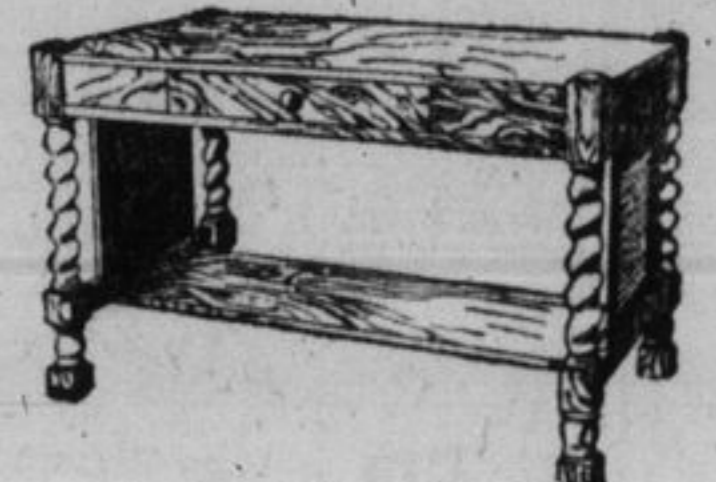


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Bob Zuppke, Illinois football coach, thinks the new football rule will tend to make a good place kicker strong asset to a team.
