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LOOK FOR YANKEES.

To Repeat in the American League Race This Year. New York ought to win the American League pennant, but there are three good reasons why the Yanks have no clinch ahead of them—St. Louis, Cleveland and Washington. Such a smart baseball man as Johnny Evers refuses to pick a winner. "It's going to be a heart-breaking race. Even the Boston Red Sox have a chance," Evers says. The class of the league is so evenly distributed between four clubs that handling may be the biggest factor in the race and in this respect the Yanks by no means can be considered the favorite. The Yanks won the pennant last year and they have improved the club with the mobilization of the best pitching staff in the league. The St. Louis Browns are stronger only by one rookie pitcher. The Cleveland Indians have a better pitcher, but their old pitching trouble is not corrected much. Washington is improved all around, but lacks pitchers. Admitting that one guess is as good as another, the following is submitted by a fan to be either buried or hoisted on the pole next October: New York first; St. Louis second; Cleveland third; Washington fourth; Boston fifth; Detroit sixth; Philadelphia seventh, and Chicago eighth.

Canucks on All-Boston Team. Three Canadian players have been picked on the All-Boston hockey team, the mythical combination selected by a local paper as the very best in the field. The three men chosen all played with the Westminsters during the past season, and are Norman Shay, forward; Herb Reaume, goal; and Adam G. Smith, defense. Two other Canadian, Pop Conley and Ajax Campbell, were chosen as substitutes on the team. Smith, Shay and Reaume hail from Hamilton, Ont.; Campbell is from the Maritime Provinces while Pop Conley is a Quebec product and first handed the stock at Sherbrooke.
