

# CONCRETE for surfacing of course but what of the other features that contribute to ROAD PERMANENCE

Upholders of "building roads for permanence" must-to be consistent-recognize that true permanence calls for something more than merely the right surfacing material.

With the adoption of Concrete for the road's surface, we must also realize that other factors besides the surfacing enter into the building of

permanent highways of concrete

As the initial cost-per-mile increases; more care must be taken to protect the investment.

This protection includes:

- (a) A proper location.
- (b) The establishment of satisfactory grades.
- (c) A Drainage Plan capable of carrying away surface and ground water; together with the installation of Culverts and Bridges adequate for the carrying of modern loads.
- (d) The widening out of the sub-grade,

Such care in the preliminary work, may require considerable patience before the road is ready for surfacing. But the inconvenience of the delay, and the increased investment, are both amply justified by the permanent character of the work which results.

On main highways a high type of surfacing is needed for the carrying of modern traffic. This higher type of surfacing is most truly an economy when it is accompanied by the higher type of construction throughout.
