FATHER ARTHUR STALEY SUCCUMBS TO INJURY

Passes Away in Toronto Hospital—Skull Fractured in Auto Accident.

Rev. Father Arthur Staley, rector of the Roman Catholic church, Weston, passed away in St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, Wednesday evening. Word was received by friends in Kingston that little hope of recovery from the injury sustained in the automobile accident last Friday was entertained from the first. The news of his passing was received with deep regret, for the deceased was beloved by all associated with him in his religious work. Rev. Arthur Staley was born at Wolfe Island, being the eldest son of Daniel Staley. He was educated at the separate school, Wolfe Island, and St. Michael's College, Toronto. For several years after ordination he was assistant to Rev. Father McCann at St. Francis' church, Toronto. He was appointed pastor of Weston church about ten years ago, which position he occupied at the time of his death. Of a happy disposition he was beloved by priests and people.

He is survived by his father, Daniel Staley, Toronto; four brothers, including Rev. Louis Staley, Chesterville, and Rev. Melville Staley, Thorold; and four sisters, two in the sisterhood, Loretta Community, Toronto; Mrs. L. Shyne and Mrs. Samuel Brooks, Toronto. The remains will be brought to Kingston via G. T. R. on Friday evening and the funeral will take place from M. P. Keyes undertaking parlors to St. Mary's Cathedral on Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

ALD. GRAHAM BUSY IN CATARAQUI'S INTERESTS

He is Pushing Ahead Improvements to the Township Hall Entrance.

A curbing will be built to the road and the ground will be filled in for a driveway.

She was attended by Miss Irene Grames, Prescott, who wore a navy blue silk dress and hat to match. Mack Cunningham was groomsmen.

Following the ceremony the bridal couple drove to the home of the bride, where a dainty breakfast was served. The bride received many costly presents, including checks. After congratulations, Mr. and Mrs. Frasso left on the noon train for the coast for their honeymoon. On their return they will reside at 87 Earl street. NOTED PREACHER COMING.

At Victoria, B.C., Divine to Preach at Chalmers.

Announcement was made last Sunday in Chalmers' Church that anniversary services will be held next Sunday. The special preacher will be the Rev. Dr. W. G. Wilson, of Victoria, B.C.

Dr. Wilson is a brother of the present minister at Chalmers' church, and has preached in Kingston before. He is a strong, virile preacher with a living message. For some years he was the outstanding figure in the religious and philanthropic life of the province of Saskatchewan. As minister of St. Andrew's church, Moose Jaw, he preached every Sunday to congregations which taxed the seating capacity of one of the largest churches in Canada. Last year he moved to Victoria, B.C. The same success seems to have followed him to his new field. One example of his worth and catholicity is indicated by the fact that at his reception in Victoria the Roman Catholic Archbishop, the Anglican Bishop, the lieutenant governor, the premier of the province and the mayor of the city joined with the ministers of the churches of the city in according him a public welcome. The services in Chalmers' next Sunday will undoubtedly be of unusual public interest.

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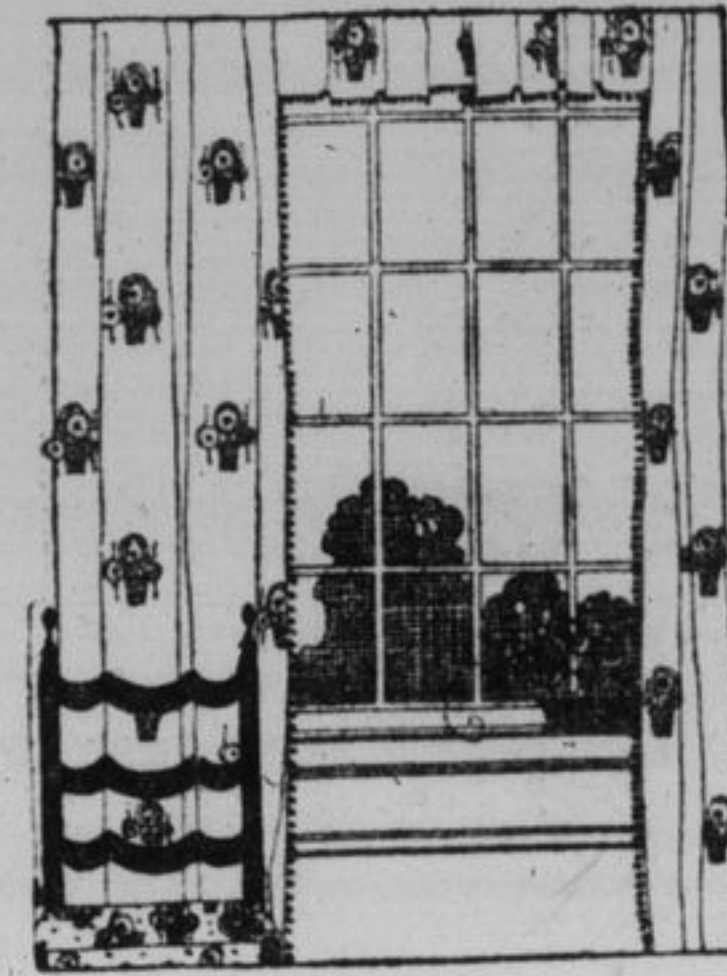
