GERMANY'S UNCERTAINTY SEEN IN ERRATIC MARK

Poincare's Speech Acted as a Pessimistic Factor on the Exchange.

London, April 28.—The temperamental paper mark staggers like a drunken sailor today, symbolizing Germany's hazy state of mind about everything. Opening around 237, it reeled onward and upward to 256, only to fall back to 252 to the dollar. The official Reichsbank quotation then sagged to 249, and then lurched upward again late in the afternoon.

Torn by conflicting emotions, the state of mind of the Boer and Germans generally may be expressed in the phrase, "Poincare vs. Morgon." On the one hand, Poincare's speech proved a pessimistic factor; on the other hand, the report that J. P. Morgon had accepted the Reparations Commission's invitation to participate in the practical solution of the reparation problem via an international loan to Germany, was the outstanding optimistic factor, and the wise ones today asserted that the prospects for such an international loan with prominent—probably dominant—American participation were much further advanced than anyone in Germany had dared to hope or believe.

But then the Germans would read Poincare's speech, which confirmed their worst fears about the approaching possibility of a French occupation of the Ruhr, and Poincare's unpleasant reminder of the ominous date, May 31st, filled their minds with forebodings of a crisis.

The reactionary Kreuzzeitung, under the heading "Poincare's declaration of war," says:

"Poincare with brutal frankness and ruthless frankness, even for a post-war French Premier, has proclaimed to the world the objectives France purposes to pursue. Anyone who knows Poincare's energy and will must realize that his words are no empty threats, but that he is determined to carry out what he says he will and, above all, is in a position to do so."

The Die Zeit, the organ of the German People's party, says:

Poincare's Threats.
"Poincare has transferred the centre of interest of European nations from Genoa to Paris. As soon as he has Genoa behind him he can cut loose against Germany. Poincare's threats are in sharp contrast to Lloyd George's conciliatory, compromise seeking attitude, and constitute a challenge to England. Let us clearly realize that the brief dream of the equality which was to dominate Genoa has been dreamed out, and that France's will for annihilation now has the say."

President Ebert in his first public speech of many months today gave expression to the Tetton fears of French occupation of the Ruhr.

"Despite our utmost endeavors to fulfil the peace conditions, we are constantly threatened with further measures of violence," Ebert told a large audience in the Opera House on the occasion of a funeral official welcome of visiting Cologne Maenner Gesangverein, one of the most famous German singing societies which was probably mobilized and rushed Berlinward by special train for propaganda purposes.

"You have come from the Rhine to the capital to fasten new ties and strengthen interest in the straits of our Rhineland," Ebert told the singers. "Great are your anxieties and worries which you must rear in addition to the general difficulties of our people. Be assured a heavy consciousness burdens us all that our fellow countrymen in the west are prevented from unfolding their forces freely and co-operating unhindered in the reconstruction of our national and economic life."

How shall a peace atmosphere arise when we are constantly threatened with further measures of violence is a question, and yet every nation on earth needs peace as imperatively as bread. The Rhineland population is in the first line under foreign force, but in these heavy years it has given ever new proofs of loyalty to the Fatherland. The idea of Rhineland's separation from the Reich is imported from outside, and, fostered by fantastic intriguers and adventurers of the worst sort in the country, has been indignantly rejected by the Rhineland people. To urge you to remain loyal, therefore, is unnecessary."

VIEWS WITH ALARM APPEALS FOR DIVORCE

Montreal Synod Sees Marriage Being Regarded as Too Lightly.

Montreal, April 28.—At yesterday morning's session of the annual conference of the Anglican synod of Montreal, a motion was proposed for adoption as follows: "That the synod express an alarm at the increasing number of applications for divorce to the senate of the dominion and the increase of the evil of divorce generally; and that it instruct the committee on marriage and divorce to take any action possible on behalf of the synod in co-operation with other dioceses, and oppose the granting by the parliament of Canada of grounds and facilities for divorce, so as to maintain fully the indissolubility of marriage according to the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Addressing the synod, Rev. Canon C. W. Vernon, general secretary of the social service committee of the church of England, in Canada, declared that young people regarded marriage too lightly.
