Watson, Pte. R. W. Wilson. Some of them returned badly maimed and wounded.

Avails Call to Korea.
Rev. R. G. Fry, Queen's University, who has volunteered for foreign mission service in Korea, under the auspices of the Presbyterian church, is on his way to Western Canada, where he will have charge this summer of the mission field near the town of Biggar in Northern Saskatchewan. Rev. R. G. Fry is one of those who have responded to the call for more foreign missionaries, but who cannot proceed to China or Korea this year unless special additional church funds are forthcoming.

Refrigeration Expert Here.
A. M. MacLean, of the Linde Refrigeration Company, Montreal, returned to the city on Wednesday, after spending the last month at Camp Borden, where an ice-plant was installed. Mr. MacLean has charge of the refrigeration work at the General Hospital here, but the work is not far enough advanced here to warrant his immediate attention. He left for Brockville Wednesday evening to inspect a small plant there.

Is Fatally Burned.
Word has reached Belleville that Mrs. Mary Schuster, burned at the home of her son in Pittsburgh while before a grate fire, is not making any progress toward recovery. Mrs. Schuster is about ninety years of age, and is the widow of Rev. A. Schuster. She was for many years engaged in mission work in Belleville. Her son, Capt. W. E. Schuster, has been called to her bedside. Hopes for her recovery are very slight.

Will Report on School Children.
Miss Edna Squires, Toronto, a professional nurse engaged by the provincial board of health, has examined all the children in the Church street school, Almonte, and will make a detailed report to the local board of education. All the children have been weighed and measured, and the local doctors have also examined those that Miss Squires considered should be attended to. She has been there for three weeks and is now doing some follow-up work. Miss Squires and Miss Hamilton, who is now at Carleton Place, have been assigned to the county of Lanark. They will examine the children of two schools in each township.

Magistrate Wins Action.
A libel action brought by Police Magistrate A. R. G. Peden against Chief of Police Fred Nichols, Carleton Place, was tried before Justice Latohford at the Perth spring sittings, and, on the evidence, the jury found a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$50 and all costs. The action was the result of a letter written by the defendant in June, 1921, to the police committee of the Carleton Place town council, complaining that the plaintiff had been absent from the municipality on several occasions without appointing another magistrate in his place; also that the plaintiff's decisions in trials were open to discussion and he made up his mind on a case before hearing the evidence.
