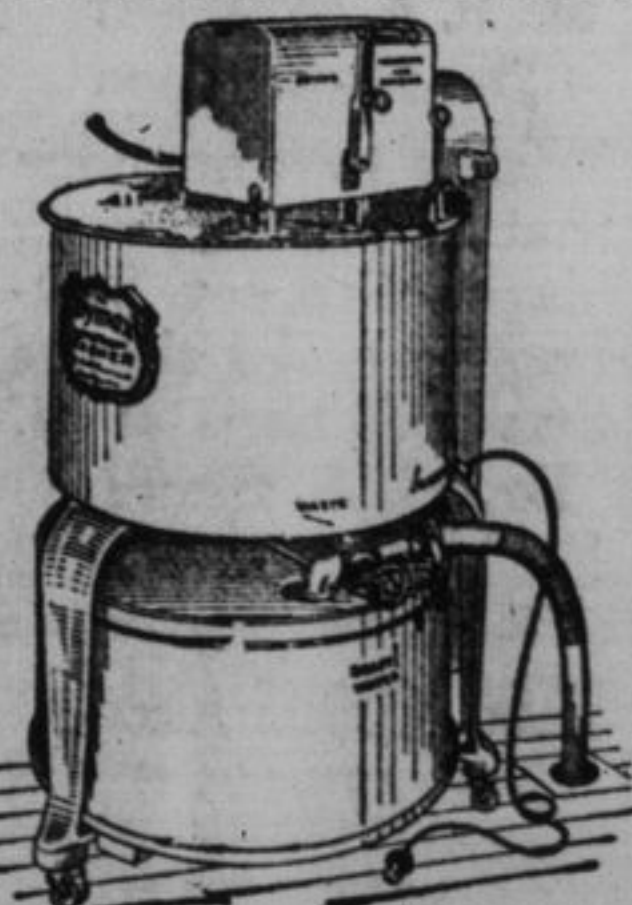

School Bonds Sold at 101 39.
Belleville has sold the bonds for
the new King George school to the
firm of McLeod, Young & Weir, To-
ronto, at 101.39, considered a very
fine sale. The debentures were \$120,-
000 for thirty years at 5 1-2 per
cent. The money costs the city about
5.41 per cent.

A Selby Girl Took It.
The Queen of the second annual
Mardi Gras of the American Legion
of Monroe county, Rochester, N. Y.,
was Miss Anna Driscoll, daughter of
Mrs. Mabel Driscoll, formerly of
Selby, Ont. She was the unanimous
choice of 8,000 persons who attend-
ed the carnival at Rochester State
Armory.

A Son in Kingston.
An interesting feature in con-
nection with the invention by Capt. T.
York, of Rockland, of a machine
which will revolutionize motive
power, is that a son of the inventor,
Sydney York, is employed at Syden-
ham Hospital in Kingston. Another
son, Earl, resides in Ottawa. Power
for the new machine is generated
from the air, and a demonstration on
a motor-car will be given in Ottawa
shortly.

Old Orangemen Honored.
F. M. Clarke, Belleville, who has
been for fifty-five years a member of
L.O.L. No. 274, and W. C. Reid, for

forty years a member of the same
lodge, were presented with an ad-
dress at a banquet held by the mem-
bers of L.O.L. Nos. 274 and 2519.
Both these men have been grand
lodge officers for many years. The
former grand secretary and the lat-
ter grand treasurer of Eastern On-
tario grand lodge.

A Fine Still.
The still discovered in a building
at the corner of Princess and Mont-
real streets by Provincial Constable
Clark and License Inspector McCam-
mon, on Monday, has been placed in
the possession of Inland Revenue Of-
ficer Montgomery. It is regarded as
the most complete apparatus yet
found as the parts were clearly made
for the purpose for which they were
intended. The still itself is a cop-
per worm to carry off the alcohol
which forms on the cover which is
so constructed that it will hold ice
water to hasten condensation. The
rest of the equipment consisted of a
ten gallon earthen crock full of mash
in an advanced state of fermenta-
tion, and a tub containing a gallon of
dark liquor with a high alcoholic con-
tent.

Fair Grounds Repairs.
The city property committee met
on Monday afternoon and opened the
tenders called for building 542 feet

of fence at the fair grounds. Nine
tenders were received. The highest
was \$1,185 and the lowest \$365 and
they included the labor and material.
The tender for labor was awarded to
Fred W. Smith at \$135 and the city
will supply the material, estimated
at \$230.

The engineer was authorized to
call for tenders for the painting of
the city hall dome.
The members present were: Ald.
H. T. Sargent, (chairman), Mayor
Corbett, Aids. H. Kelly, G. Laturney,
W. Holder and P. Angrove.

Standard Hotel License Change.
The local license inspector, Wil-
liam McCammon, has received a copy
of a resolution passed by the Ontario
Board of License Commissioners. It
reads as follows:

"Whereas, it is desirable that the
standard hotels license year be
changed to conform to the provincial
fiscal year, beginning each Novem-
ber 1st, taking effect on the said date
in 1922, resolved that the said
change be made and that existing
standard hotel licenses be extended
for six months ending Oct. 31st,
1922, except as to standard hotel
licenses which inspectors recommend
be not renewed, and which if renew-
ed or extended will be dealt with
separately, also that license inspec-
tors be instructed accordingly."

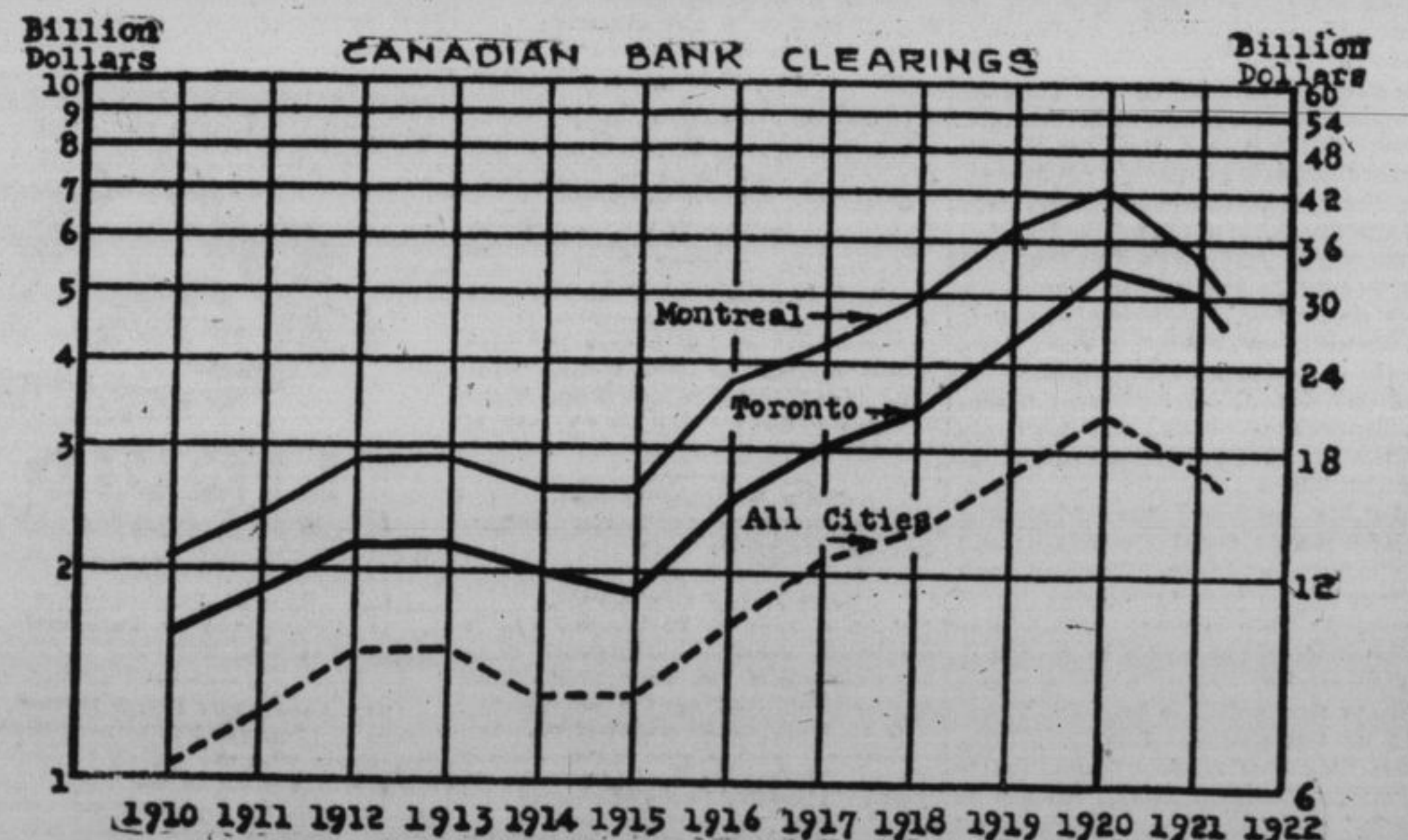

The volume of Bank Clearings is dependent upon a variety of conditions, such as the general level of com-
modity and security prices, real estate and building activity, railroad earnings, industrial activity, etc. Therefore
the volume of clearings is one of the several media by which the general industrial condition of a city or a coun-
try may be more or less accurately judged.

In the above chart, prepared especially for the British Whig, annual clearings for Montreal, Toronto, and
all Canadian cities are shown for the years 1910 to 1921 inclusive. The scale on the left applies to Montreal and
Toronto figures, while that on the right applies to the line showing clearings of all cities. The scale used in both
cases is the ratio or logarithmic scale. The advantage of this over the ordinary or arithmetic scale being that
the percentage change in trends of any group of figures, however large or small, may be more accurately pictured
and compared. Thus, the chart clearly brings out the fact that, during the last decade, Montreal and Toronto
have not changed their relative positions as far as clearings are concerned; in every year except 1921 they rose
or fell in almost exactly the same proportion. The same applies to total Canadian clearings. The yearly in-
creases in each case since 1910 has been approximately 9%, 1920 clearances being about 3 1/2 times those of
1910.

A study of these figures shows that clearings—or the use of cheques in business—are increasing at a much
faster rate than population. In the early part of this century, currency notes, issued by the dominion govern-
ment and our various banks, were almost as important as cheques in business transactions, but now the principal
medium of exchange in our business is the cheque, bank notes really being our "small change." This is
especially emphasized in the fact that, in 1921, the amount of cheque transactions in Montreal per head of popu-
lation was over \$8,000.00. This figure compares favorably with New York (\$20,000.00), which is an interna-
tional money and speculation centre.

Clearing house figures for the first three months of 1922 do not reflect an early return of prosperity prin-
cipally because our farming population (who are still our greatest producers) suffered so severely from recent
deflation of their products. Any substantial improvement in agricultural prices will do more than anything
else to bring business back to normal.
