LOVE SPURNED BY PEGGY CUBAN SHOTS HIMSELF

Paid Frantic Court to Actress
But She Planned to Wed
Parisian.

Paris, May 3.—The police have started an investigation of the statement of Peggy Hopkins Joyce that William Errazuriz, young Chilean diplomat, killed himself in a room next her suite in the Hotel Claridge because she rejected his ardent love. Errazuriz, whose sister, Blanca de Saulles, caused a tremendous sensation in America in 1917 by slaying her husband, wealthy society man and former Yale athlete, was found dying Sunday with a revolver grasped in his hand. It was at first a mystery.

Then Peggy Hopkins Joyce, whose matrimonial adventures have gained fame for her on two continents, came forward and told a dramatic story of her last night with young Errazuriz. She told of frantic court paid by the wealthy youth, and of how he had been insanely jealous of the attentions showered on her by Henri Letellier, owner of Le Journal, whom Peggy says she intends to wed. According to Peggy, much champagne was consumed when the party returned to the Claridge early Sunday morning.

After Letellier had left, according to Peggy, Errazuriz made a final desperate plea for her hand. He wished her to marry him, when a papal divorce had been granted, she said. On his knees in her boudoir he begged her to give up Letellier. With all the ardour of his race, he pleaded. But the former wife of Stanley Joyce remained firm in her intention to be faithful to Letellier. She refused him, gently at first—then sternly.

Errazuriz withdrew in tears. He went to his room, which was next to Peggy's. The actress declared she heard a muffled shot. When the door was broken in the young Chilean lay dying from a pistol wound in his head. He lingered a while, but made no statement.

Peggy declared she was prostrated with grief. The hotel authorities considered asking her to move, because of the notoriety brought upon the ultra-conservative hotel, but Peggy's doctors said she was too ill. The police have begun a rigid investigation of her story. The Chilean legation cast doubt upon it. The legation pointed out that Errazuriz had long been a neurotic, and had left letters saying he was in financial difficulties.

Irish Help for Farms.

The agent-general for Ontario in England is endeavoring to locate 200 ex-members of the Royal Irish Constabulary force on farms in Ontario, and has sent out circulars to the local agricultural representatives asking that the matter be taken up with the farmers seeking farm labor. Only men between 25 and 35 years of age will be sent if a favorable report is sent. It is sought to secure a yearly contract for these men at a monthly wage of from \$10 to \$15 a month. The party can be landed in Ontario about the latter part of May or beginning of June.

Police Court Brevities.

A tippler who said he secured three bottles of lemon extract from local stores was fined \$10 and costs in the police court Wednesday morning. The case of a Chinaman accused of having opium in his possession, was enlarged for Tuesday. The stuff which was confiscated has been analyzed and it is understood has been pronounced as opium.
