Happy Are the Bachelors! Earl Cathcart's refusal to pay an unauthorized bill contracted by his wife—now his ex-wife—for eight gowns has brought a pronouncement

from the public trustee office as to what proportion of a husband's income may properly be spent for his wife's adornment. The pronouncement is:

If a man is getting \$50,000 a year, his wife should receive \$5,000 for clothes.

But—if he is getting only \$10,000, the wife should be content to struggle along on \$500 a year, and the latter ratio of 5 per cent. should rule for lower incomes.

However, the opinion of public trustee office officials has not gone unchallenged.

"Less than one-tenth of a man's income, if it is above \$10,000 a year, is certainly not sufficient," said Lady Alexander, widow of Sir George Alexander, and one of the most fashionably dressed women in London.

"A woman who attends social functions and has many friends needs at least 18 dresses and a dozen hats a year.

"She should have three evening dresses, two demit-toilettes, four tea gowns, three tailored suits, one for country wear, two garden party frocks, one elaborate summer dress, two morning or shopping dresses, and one nice solid summer dress—and that is not counting coats, woolen dresses, jumpers and separate skirts, to say nothing of gloves and stockings—ruinous items in these days."

Efficient Housekeeping by Laura A. Kirkman

Liver and Kidney in The Supper Menu. Liver and Kidney cooked in a casserole make delicious supper dishes. A lamb's liver is considered by many housekeepers to be quite as delicate as calf's liver, and is most delicious when served as in the following menu:

Lamb's Liver en Casserole  
Corn Muffins  
Diced Fruit Topped With Meringue  
Cocoa

Lamb's Liver en Casserole: Cut the liver in thick slices and cover these slices with boiling water; let stand five minutes, then drain. Butter a casserole, or any baking dish, and arrange in the bottom a layer of uncooked vegetables consisting of sliced carrots, turnips and onions; add the slices of liver, a bouquet of herbs (parsley, savory and thyme), and pour over all one pint of stock made by seasoning a can of consommé with salt and pepper to taste, or by dissolving bouillon cubes in hot water. Sprinkle over the top a couple of pieces of cooked, crisp bacon finely chopped, cover the dish tightly, and place in a hot oven for two hours (perhaps a little shorter time). Remove from oven, stir into the dish two tablespoons of flour mixed to a paste with a little cold

water, flavor with a teaspoonful of "kitchen bouquet" and serve at once in the dish in which it was baked.

Mock Kidney Pie  
Quick Bisquit  
Tea  
Raisin Tarts

Mock Kidney Pie: Remove the fat from a beef kidney and let stand overnight in cold water (to cover) containing one-fourth of a teaspoon of baking soda dissolved in it. In the morning drain, dry, and cut in small pieces, removing all strings. Fry these small pieces in two tablespoons of bacon fat with one-half onion finely minced. When delicately brown, add two tablespoons of flour, one-half cup of stock (made by dissolving one bouillon cube in hot water), and one cup of strained liquor from a can of tomatoes. Stir constantly till the sauce has thickened and let simmer till the kidneys are tender. Then turn all into a baking dish or casserole, add four slices of crisply cooked bacon finely minced, and spread buttered bread crumbs over the top of the dish. Brown under the broiler, or place the dish in the top of a hot oven to brown. This "pie" will look as delicious as one with a pastry top, and taste fully as good.

Oatmeal Cookies are delicious to serve with a little supper such as this. A Reader Friend has sent in the

following: "Cream together one cup of sugar, and one cup of shortening, stir in two eggs, two cups of oat-flakes, two cups of wheat flour, four tablespoons of sweet milk, one teaspoon each of ground cinnamon and soda, one-half teaspoon of salt and one cup of washed and chopped raisins. Drop this batter by large spoonfuls onto a greased pan, flatten out with a knife, and bake for about eight minutes in a hot oven.
