### FINANCIAL TERMS FOR WESTERN CITY

Swift Current Has Five-Year Term Agreement to Straighten Out.

Swift Current, Sask., May 4 .- Representatives of city, banks and bondholders have reached ar agreement relative to the bonded indebtedness of Swift Current, which will likely be confirmed by all concerned. The agreement is: For a period of five years the city of Swift Current will pay interest only on its indebtedness at 3 per cent., with the proviso that any interest not collected up to three per cent. in any year, will be paid in subsequent years, if circumstances warrant, or capitalized at

the end of the five-year period, Sinking fund and principal payments falling due during the fivepear period are to be deferred until the end of the terms.

All interest owing on debentures or to the banks, over and above the three per cent., during the five-year period, is to be written off. Provision is to be made for discount on arrears of taxes, as provided in the agreement of last year.
