meet the claim.

Mrs. Dillenbeck is the former wife of Barzell Strong, who died in 1910. In 1868 the homestead at Evans Mills was sold to one Lawton by Barzell and Pitt W. Strong, brothers, with an agreement that possession was not to go to the purchaser until the death of the mother of the Strongs. She died in 1887. In 1894. 
