

A Wide-Spread War Memorial

In memory of the war-time efforts for King and Country, of eleven thousand C.P.R. employees and more particularly of 1,115 men who gave their lives for the cause for which the British people stood, the Canadian Pacific Enilway has erected at Montreal, Winnipeg, and Vancouver a striking bronze memorial group, depicting in larger than life size an Angel of Victory bearing the body of a Canadian soldier upward towards perfect peace. These statues were simultaneously unveiled on Friday. April 28th, His Excellency Lord Byng, the Governor General, officiating at the Montreal celebration.

At the same time was unveiled the bronze tablet illustrated above. Exact duplicates of this tablet were also unveiled at all important points on the C. P. B. system between the Atlantic and the Pacific, as well as at its American, European and Asiatic offices. The tablets are about five feet in width, and were designed by Archibald Pearce of the C. P. B. Chief Engineer's Department, Montreal. The vessel on the left represents H. M. S. "Lion," Admiral Beatty's Plagship at the battle of Jutland, and that on the right the Canadian Pacific Steamship "Empress of Russia," which was engaged through the war as a fast cruiser, and later as a transport. Beside her stands a standard C. P. B. locomotive and train as having just brought in battalions ready to ambark for overseas service. The soldiers in the centre represents all arms of the service. The base of the

statues bear the same legend as do the tablets.

Enlistments of C.P.B. employees totalled 11,340 men, of which 1,115 were killed or died of wounds, and 2,166 were wounded. A total of 7,578 were re-employed by the company on their return to Canada, following out the C.P.B. policy of re-instating every man who left, in as good a job as that which he had when he went away, and a total of 13,112 other returned soldiers have also been taken on the company's service. War decorations and medals won by C.P.B. employees totalled 870, and include the following:—

Victoria Cross, 2; Order of the British Empire, 6; Distinguished Service Order, 17; Distinguished Service Cross, 3; Military Cross, 54; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 47; Military Medal, 186.
