Purchased a Residence.
Hon. A. C. Hardy, Brockville, has purchased the residence of John F. Burstall, Daly avenue, Ottawa, for \$75,000. Senator Hardy will occupy his new home during the seasonal months.

Will Remain Here.
Elders James and Taylor, evangelists of the Mormon church returned to the city from Ottawa on Tuesday. The former has been transferred to Montreal, while the latter will stay in Kingston and "labor" for the cause of their church.

Left for Northland.
Cyril McClory, Queen's University, accompanied by his friend, Mr. Chamberlain, a geologist, have left for New Ontario where they will be engaged in connection with silver mining operations during the next few months.

Always Popular.
The Front road from Portsmouth to Lamorne's Point is showing up as a very popular motor drive this season. The roads out that way are usually in pretty fair shape and there is not a more attractive highway, scenically, in the district.

Merry Fishermen.
The bridge over the creek about one half mile west of Lake Ontario park is a favorite resort of anglers during the early evenings and on Saturdays and Sundays. Some good catches are reported out there and

occasionally one may here the anglers bursting forth into song, their repertoires extending from "Casey Jones" to "Il Trovatore."

Price Gone Up.
During the past week the retail price of gasoline increased to 39c per gallon. For some time gasoline has been selling at 37c a gallon. The Imperial Oil Company states that the wholesale price of gasoline has increased 1-2c a gallon and the price of coal oil has dropped one cent.

Puts Men Out of Work.
The arrival of the new machine to sweep the city streets means that a number of men who for years have been engaged in doing this work, will be out of employment. The members of the Board of Works realized this nevertheless the time had arrived for the purchase of a machine which would mean a saving to the city. Only two men are needed to follow the sweeping machine.

Some of the men who have been in the habit of cleaning the streets feel that a great injustice has been done them. In some cases the men are advanced in years, and are unable to do hard work such as digging.

Indignation Expressed.
A local undertaker informed the Whig on Wednesday morning that several automobiles owned by farmers were "tagged" by the police for standing on Sydenham street, between Princess and Queen streets on Tuesday afternoon while the occupants were waiting for a funeral to start. The police stated that the autos were standing more than half an hour on this street and that they were liable. The undertaker explained that the clergyman was ten minutes late in arriving for the burial service, and that was why the autos stood a little longer than the time allowed by the city by-law. He

thinks that in view of the conditions, the auto owners should not have been summoned to court. They live out of Kingston and will have to come to town to obey their summonses. All concerned are highly indignant.

Methodist District Meeting.
The annual meeting of the Kingston Methodist district has been called for May 17th and 18th. The ministerial session will open at ten o'clock in the morning of May 17th. This is a very important meeting of the district as all the financial reports for the year will be presented. As yet it is too soon to state the financial condition of the churches for the district, but it is expected that the giving will be about the same as a year ago. Sydenham street church has already reported an increase of \$450 in the missionary offering.
