leaves one brother, John Dunn, Gananoque, and three sisters, Mrs. John Morris, LaKe Elolida; Mrs. John Jacques, Soperton, and Mrs. Richard Jacques, Gananoque. She was an Anglican member of Christ church, Athens.

Will Give Much Time.
Although his activities as partner of Coverdale and Colpitts, consulting engineers, have heretofore called for a great deal of his time at the head office in New York, it is Mr. Coverdale's purpose to spend a large part of his time, probably four or five days a week, in Montreal, during the season of navigation, which will give him ample time to give close attention to the affairs of Canada Steamship Lines.

Kingston is seen as the centre of this popular summer traffic and with the roads we have now leading east, north and west to say nothing of the ferry service to American points, Cape Vincent, Clayton, Alexandria Bay and Ogdensburg, capable of carrying all kinds of cars, there will be a great influx of tourists seeking our fishing grounds and camping sites in the back lakes.

Clever Deseronto Boy.
Roy E. Wagar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Wagar, Maple Avenue, Deseronto, says the Post, has had the degree of bachelor of arts with honors in history and political and economical science conferred upon him by Queen's University. Roy was born in Deseronto and secured his earlier education in the Deseronto public and high schools. After matriculating in 1914 he spent three years teaching in Ontario and three years in Saskatchewan. Although Roy spent but two years in residence at Queen's, he was elected president of the University Debating Union, vice-president of the Commerce Club, secretary of the Polecon Club and was leader of the debating team which defeated McGill and Toronto Universities and brought the Inter-collegiate championship to Queen's for the first time in many years. Since the first of May he has been employed in the head office of the British American Oil Co., Toronto.
