IN MARINE CIRCLES

The steamer Aragon was brought to Kingston on Sunday afternoon by the tugs John L. Russell and Glide, and is now at Richardson's wharf. Her cargo of corn is being unloaded, and the pumps are going at full capacity to get rid of the water in her hold. The vessel was floated by lightning part of her cargo, and by the work of centrifugal pumps. The hole in her side was then plugged, and she was towed to the city.

CANON GOULD PREACHES

In St. Luke's Church on Anglican Mission Work.

Rev. Canon Gould, general secretary of the Canadian Missionary Society of the Anglican church, preached an able sermon on "Missions" in St. Luke's church on Sunday evening. The aim of missions, their need and an explanation of missions were taken up separately by the speaker, as well as an outline of the work in various countries. The work among the Eskimos in the Arctic Circle was beautifully pictured by Canon Gould, also among the Chinese and Japanese in British Columbia. It was the duty of all to be missionaries, concluded the speaker, as every man and woman baptized in the church was a missionary.

The minister, Rev. J. deP. Wright, thanked the congregation for their support of the concert recently held in the church, and also asked for five hundred additional books for the Sunday school library. During the service, Miss Olive Derry rendered a solo.

Canon Gould preached at the morning service in St. George's cathedral. The distinguished minister is a graduate of Queen's University, and had the honor of receiving the degree of doctor of divinity at convocation last week.

Amputated Left Arm Of Rev. Dr. H. Gracey

Surgeons at Kingston General hospital found it necessary to amputate the left arm of Rev. Dr. Gracey, Gananoque, just below the shoulder in order to arrest the spread of blood-poisoning. Dr. Gracey was brought to the hospital two weeks ago. He is over eighty years of age and served in the Presbyterian ministry for over fifty years, retiring several years ago after a long pastorate in St. Andrew's church, Gananoque. Dr. Gracey will be able to leave the hospital in a few days.

John Doughty Has Served Year on Six-Year Term

John Doughty on Monday completed one year of his six-year term for the theft of \$105,000 of Victory bonds, the property of Ambrose J. Small, the missing theatrical magnate, Toronto. Doughty was brought to the Portsmouth penitentiary on May 15th, of last year. It is understood that he is in comparatively good health, and that he still has hopes of being released before his time is up.

Death Claims Mrs. J. Moore.

At her home near Laura, Sask., on April 1st, the death occurred of Katherine, wife of John Moore, at the age of forty years. Deceased had been in poor health for some time, but her death came as a great shock to her many friends. The late Mrs. Moore was a daughter of the late Washington Vanvolkingburg, Battarsee. She, with her husband and family, came west in 1912 and has lived in the vicinity of Laura ever since.

Besides her sorrowing husband, she leaves a family of eleven children, five girls and six boys, the youngest an infant born on April 1st. The eldest, a married daughter was unable to be present at the funeral owing to the suddenness of her mother's death. But the rest were all present. She also leaves one brother on a farm near Battarsee, and some half brothers and sisters in different parts of the west.

The remains were laid to rest in the family plot near Laura on April 3rd. The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved family in their sorrow.

James Knight died in Pembroke at the ripe old age of ninety-four years. The old C.P.R. station building at Carleton Place is being torn down.
