HIGHLAND CADET PARADE

To St. Andrew's Church—
Sermon by the Rev. J. W. Stephen.

A striking lesson on the necessity of using and developing the various talents given to each man and woman on earth, and the resulting danger of losing these gifts from neglect, was given by Rev. J. W. Stephen in St. Andrew's church on Sunday morning. The sermon was very appropriate for the occasion of the parade to the church, of the members of the Highland Cadet Corps of Kingston, and the minister delivered a special message to these boys, for their guidance through life.

Mr. Stephen told the story of the three servants who had been given five, two and one talents respectively by their master, and of what use they had made of their money. While the first two men doubled their wealth in a few years, the other, through laziness and neglect, only could show one talent to his master, and this was also taken away from him. So it is in our daily life, continued the preacher. Each one of us has some talent or other, some more than others, but everybody is given at least one. Some have mechanical, philosophical, musical, social, business, the qualities of leadership, or some other talents, and these must be developed.

It is a good thing to discover any talent, early in life, as then the boy or girl may follow their chosen vocation in life, interested and happy. But this talent must be used constantly, or it will be lost. It is the same with physical or mental powers—neglect them, and they will soon disappear or become useless. The spiritual talents, faith, hope and love, are also God-given gifts, and it is the purpose of the Christian church to develop and strengthen these wonderful gifts.

The highland cadets presented a very smart appearance while marching to and from the church, and many complimentary remarks were heard in regard to their parade. The church was decorated with wild flowers to mark Mother's Day.

THREE COWS SUFFOCATED WHEN A STABLE BURNED

Lively Fire in Rear of Royal Hotel After Midnight Saturday.

Three valuable Jersey cows were suffocated to death in a fire which broke out at 12.40 o'clock on Sunday morning, in an old stone stable at the rear of the Royal hotel, upper Princess street, conducted by Patrick McKenna. A number of kittens making their home in the stable also lost their lives.

The fire hall on Brock street also had a close call, as the stable where the fire occurred is just about twenty feet from the fire hall. The firemen had quite a hard task to keep the fire from spreading, and spent about three hours and a half on the job. It was thought by a great many that the fire station was ablaze. The station was certainly in great danger, as well as many other buildings nearby. It is understood that the city carries no insurance on its fire hall, and if such is the case, this fire should serve as a warning to the civic authorities and point out that even a fire hall is apt to fall a prey to the flames in spite of a good band of fire fighters.

The cause of the stable fire is unknown. It was going at a lively rate when the firemen arrived on the scene, and they worked hard to get it under control and to protect the buildings close by, but before the fire had been extinguished, the entire roof had been destroyed. The building is 100 feet by 30 feet. In addition to the loss of live stock, two tons of hay were destroyed. Telephone wires located near the fire suffered.

Mr. McKenna will suffer as a result of the loss of the three cows. The property is owned by the Grimison estate.

It is a wonder the loss was not more serious as the stable is located in a rather congested part of the city, and while the building was ablaze the sparks made their way to many of the nearby buildings and gave the firemen extra work.

A calf was rescued from the burning stable. It was almost suffocated but came around all right after being given attention.

Firemen Had Four Calls.

The firemen had four calls since Saturday morning. The first call came in the forenoon for a chimney fire on Denham street, at a home occupied by a family named Anglin. There was no damage.

At 2.17 Sunday afternoon the brigade was called to the Wormwith piano works. A cigarette dropped into a grate off the sidewalk set fire to some rubbish. No damage.

At 8 o'clock on Monday morning a fire started behind a baseboard at the home of George Kirkpatrick, corner of Brock and Division streets. Only slight damage was done.

Delco Light in Barrieffield.

EVANGELIST MATHESON OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN

I hope that we shall all now represent Him in the right way, as He is not here to represent Himself."

God has given all that He might exalt us, that He might save us from sin, from the power of sin, and from the presence of sin. In speaking of man's attitude to man, he said, "You can form a prejudice, and in that way retard your way to Heaven. Don't get your prejudice without reason."

The most wonderful collection of worldly goods count as nothing to a man, who has caught a glimpse of God and the things worth while. What is better than knowing the Lord who came down from Heaven to save the lost?

"I preach in the power of the Holy Ghost to save sinners, in the name of Him who said, 'I am with you always, even unto the end of the world.' God knows when there is deception, so do not hope to keep your sins from the eye of God. It is one thing to pray and another thing to mingle your prayers with the Lord Jesus Christ who is ever willing to answer your prayers. If God does not hear the wicked who is going to be saved? And we must go like Jesus to the homeless and the wicked with message of good cheer and goodness."

Brothers Newman and Kinch were on the platform with Mr. Matheson, who will conduct revival meetings every night next week including Saturday, in Babel church.

FAST TRANS-CONTINENTAL.

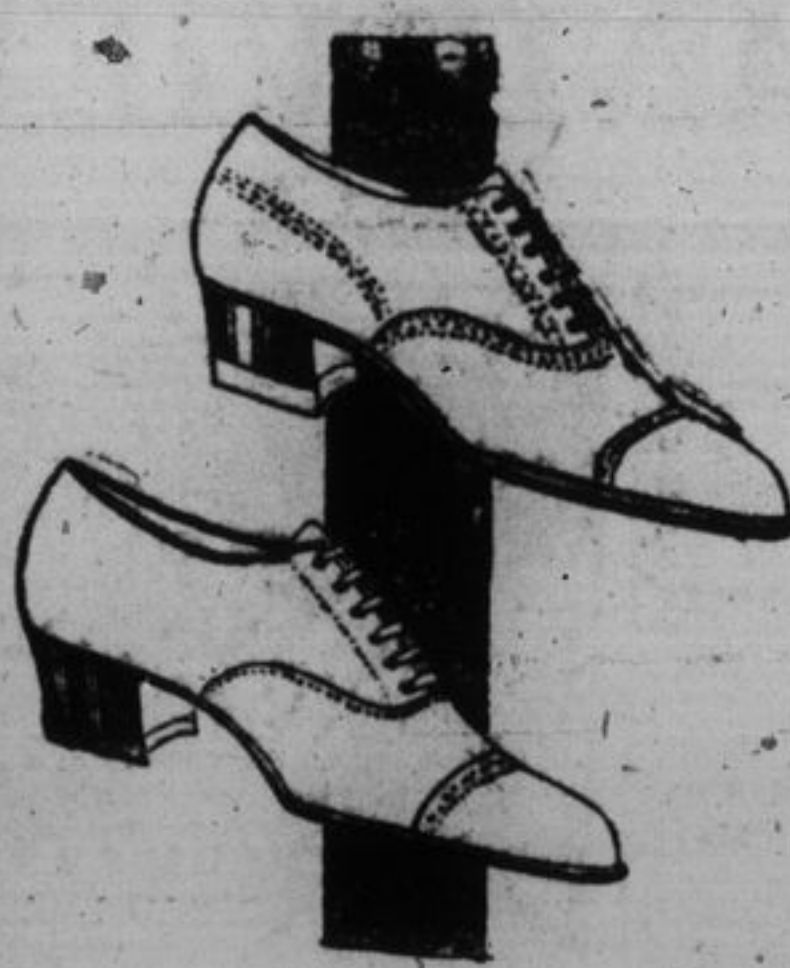
Canadian Pacific Railway "Trans-Canada Limited."

Commencing Sunday, May 21st, the "Trans-Canada Limited" the fast trans-continental train of the Canadian Pacific will operate between Toronto and Vancouver daily, this in addition to the "Vancouver Express" now operating, making two trans-continental trains daily between Toronto and Vancouver. "Trans-Canada Limited" thus, Toronto to Vancouver, is 83 hours, this being the shortest time scheduled for any trans-continental train on the continent. It carries first-class sleeping car passengers only, and the schedule is so arranged as to provide for convenient hours of arrival at the different principal points and gives the Canadian Pacific Rocky Mountain scenery in daylight. A business day is saved on the trans-continental trip, as the business man has had his breakfast and is ready for business the second morning in Winnipeg, the third morning in Calgary, and the fourth morning in Vancouver.

The Canadian Pacific will, this summer, have four trans-continental trains each way every day over the mountains.

Rescued From Drowning.

Carl Dowsett, the six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Dowsett, Smith's Falls, was rescued from drowning on Tuesday by Clara McKay, aged twelve years. A number of boys were fishing near the four mill race when young Dowsett somehow fell into the water. Clara McKay jumped into the water after him at once, and succeeded in bringing him ashore the boy was escorted home, his rescuer and a couple of others forming the escort. 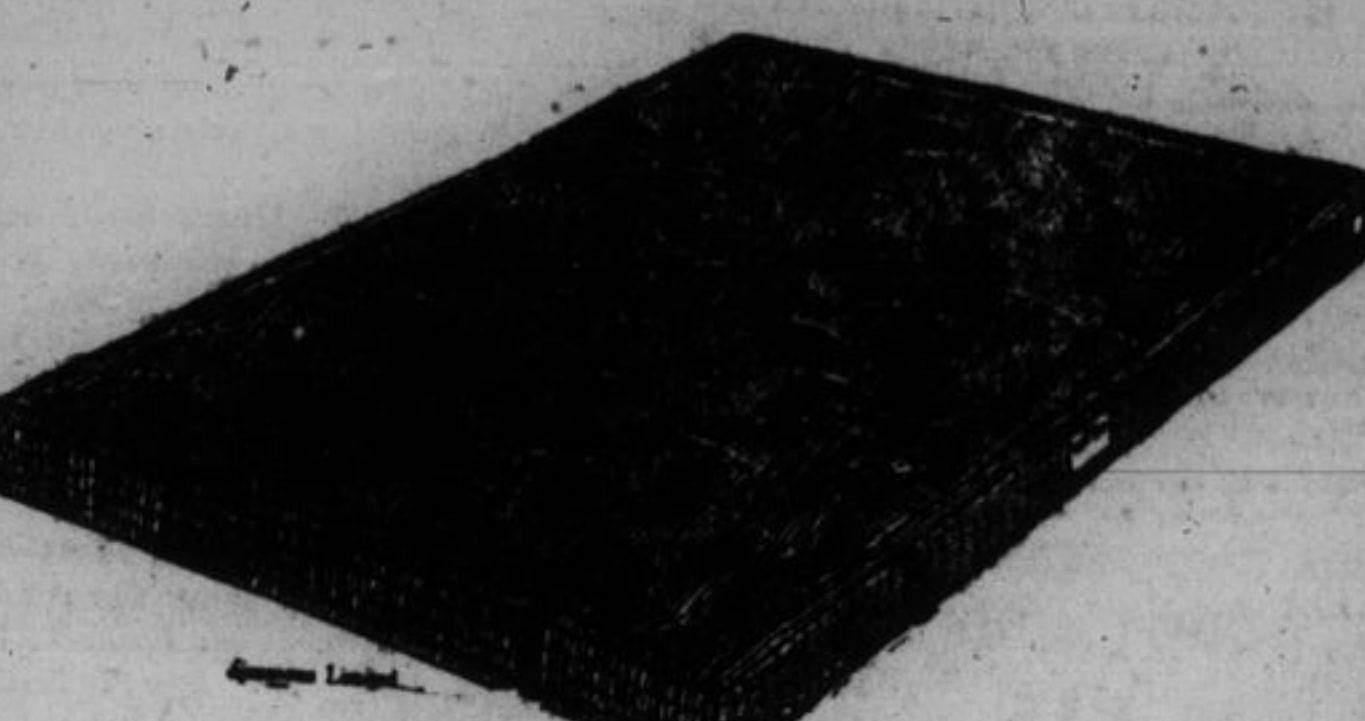

An estate which has been probated for \$825,452.39 was left by the late George Y. Chown. The property consists of book debts and promissory notes \$11,522.50, mortgages \$5,000, insurance \$10,000, stocks \$703,000, bonds \$380, cash in bank \$32,889.89, and real estate \$89,750.

Under a will dated 18th Feb., 1921, the testator bequeathed his house and all furniture to his widow, who is also to get the entire income from his estate during her lifetime. "Upon the death of my said wife," instructs the will "my executors are to distribute my estate, real and personal, as if I had died intestate." The executors are William Folger Nickle, K.C., M.P.P., John McL. Stephen, and the deceased's daughter, Mary L. Chown.

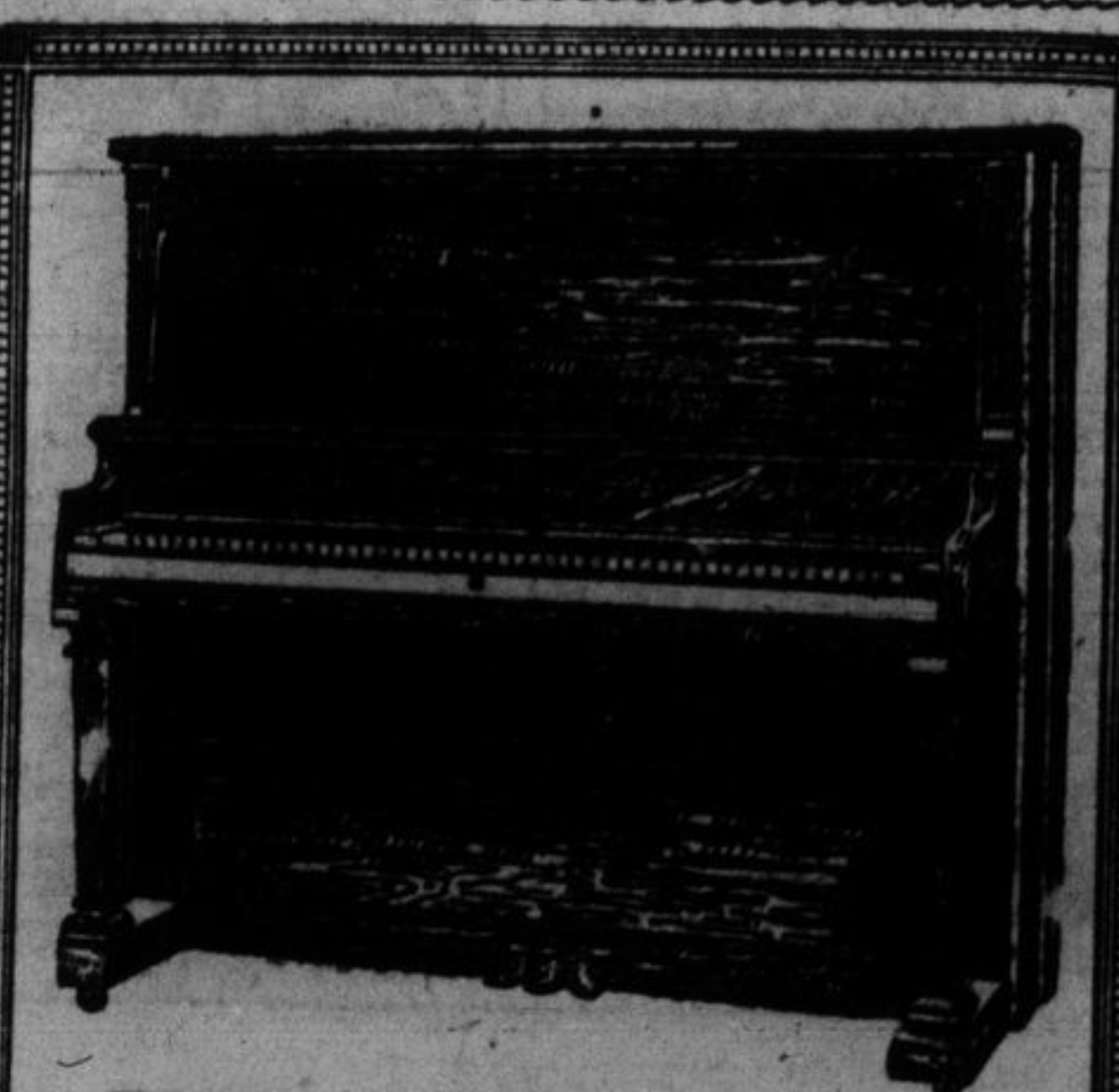
