KIRKWOOD MAY LOCATE IN CANADA

Australian Golfer is Now on His Second Swing Around the Map.

Joe Kirkwood, the Australian golfer, is off again. As a traveler, Kirkwood has all other golfers trailing him by several ocean liners and a great many Pullman reservations. He always has a long-strip ticket somewhere about his person.

Some of the other golf professionals made one Westward leap across the Atlantic and settle down on this side for the remainder of their golfing lives. Not so Kirkwood.

The Australian trick-shot player, who is one of the world's greatest golfers, called last week for Great Britain. Joe and Marshal Joffre were among the distinguished passengers who occupied saloon cabins on the Red Line Celtic when the ship made the dash for the three-mile limit.

It was only a few weeks ago that Kirkwood sighted the Pacific Coast of America, after some fifteen days' journey from his home town in Australia. After playing in the British open championship at Sandwich, Kirkwood will go to France for the French open, and then return to America. He plans to hop back to Australia by way of Japan and China.

This is Kirkwood's second world jaunt, but it is not his last. He will be coming back to America again in 1933 perhaps to remain. He is likely to locate in Canada, for one of the large Canadian clubs believes that it would be a splendid thing for Canadian golf to have such a player as Kirkwood as a representative.

SOME HORSE!

Never to have had one's colors beaten would appear to mark an owner as the holder of a special dispensation from Lady Luck. But for one of that owner's color-bearers to have been headed but for an instant in a dozen different events in which he was meeting the aristocrats of the turf world and on that occasion to have dashed to the front to remain there for the rest of the distance is a record which probably never has fallen to the racing fortunes of any other horse than Morvich. Ben Block, owner of Morvich, the prince of the two-year-olds of 1921, and the recently crowned King of the three-year-olds by virtue of his outstanding win of the Churchill Downs classic—the Kentucky Derby—is the one sportsman in America who enjoys the special exemption which has fallen to the lot of no one else on the turf, and Morvich has been "looked in the eye" in a race but once.

Aside from the remarkable career of Morvich as a two-year-old, the programme of his owner in taking all and sundry into his confidence through the medium of showing every training move of the colt was without precedent. The Block assertion that the wonderful Morvich is in the hands of the public, so far as his racing is concerned, is markedly at variance with the line of action followed when Man o' War held the spotlight. Up to date Morvich has earned \$182,000.

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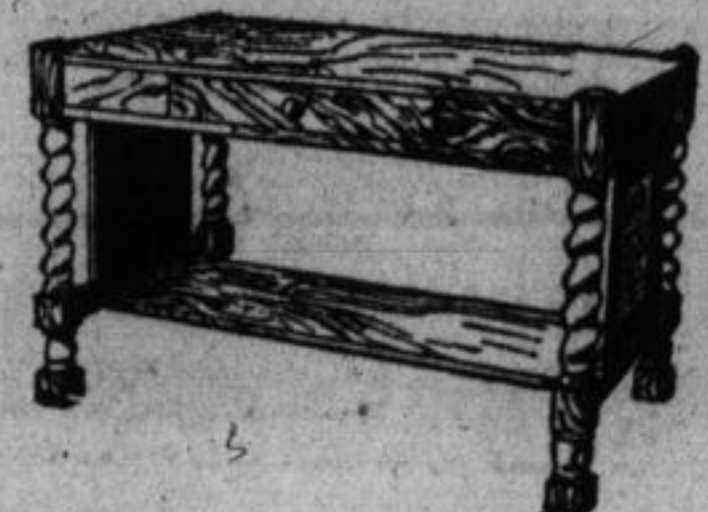
