**BUSINESS ACTIVITIES
IN CITY OF KINGSTON**

Discussing the local industrial situation, Ald. Isaac Cohen, proprietor of the Monarch Batteries Company, stated that there is now every indication of a revival of activity. "Two of these signs, 20 x 10 feet, should be placed at the G.T.R. junction, one at Barrieheld and one on the York Road at the Bath Road."

She was a member of the Anglican church, and was able at her death-bed to receive Holy Communion with a number of her family. They all mourn her departure, yet there is no call for grief in such a death as she has had one long, pure, perfect reign.

Deceased is survived by nine children, four daughters, Mrs. A. Tyrone, Kingston; Mrs. H. Morrow, Amherst Island; Mrs. J. D. Caswell, Kingston, and Miss Nellie at home, and five sons, Samuel, William and Thomas, Amherst Island; Charlie, McIntyre's Corners, and Christopher, Bath.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. C. Dixon, Stella, at her home at 1 o'clock, Friday. Mrs. Drew made mention of the virtues of her character and also mentioned the point that the world would be better off today if it possessed more such mothers who would bring up their family as she did hers.

The remains were placed in the family plot at Pentleton cemetery, where she lies between her mother and grandmother. The pall bearers were her five sons and one son-in-law, Herbert Morrow of the island.
